## State Realtor Convention to Be Postponed

Oregon realtors will not be permitted to hold a state convention this year because of a ruling of ORE that transportation facilities are still critical, it was announced at the meeting of the Salem Board of Realtors Friday noon in Hotel Marion. The convention had been scheduled for Gearhart, with the Salem board as host.

The board discussed the agreement which the state association of real estate boards had with the state bar association, William G. Hardy, one of three real estate men on the real estate association board, said every effort was being made to conclude a plan whereby real estate men refrained from engaging in "the practice of law" and at the same time to have members of the bar refrain from "breaking down" deals which real estate men had worked up.

President R. A. Forkner announced no more weekly meetings would be held until after Labor Day.

With hay down over hundreds of acres in Marion and Polk counties, and with weather threatening destruction of the curing hay, an appeal was made Friday at the Marion county emergency farm labor office for at least 38 additional hay hands for work this morning. In response to an appeal made Thursday, 20 men reported for haying Friday, but in the meantime many additional requests for help were received.

Mrs. Gladys Turnbull, farm laborer assistant, made a tour of a large part of the county Thursday and reported farmers still were cutting and trying to get along with insufficient help.

"A bright spot in the farm labor picture," Mrs. Turnbull said, "is coming up the next two weeks when the Oregon Pulp & Paper company's mill will be closed for its usual annual renovation. We are hoping all of the men working there will report for farm work during their vacation."

## County's Balance More Than Million

Marion county had a cash balance of \$1,118,968.28 on Dec. 31, 1944, according to the tax roll report turned over to County Clerk Henry C. Mattson on Friday by Stearns, Flynn & company, auditors. The report covered the period between July 1, 1943 and Dec. 31, 1944.

Net receipts from July 1, 1943 to June 30, 1944 were \$1,818,445 and from July 1, 1944 to Dec. 31, 1944 the receipts were \$1,623,274.

Taxes assessed in the county for the year ending June 30, 1944 totaled \$1,657,333 and for the last six months of 1944 were \$2,025,300.

## County Fixes Testing Fees Under New Law

County Judge Grant Murphy issued an order Friday establishing four separate veterinary districts for Marion county and fixed the maximum fees to be charged for tuberculosis and Bangs disease tests. The order was made pursuant to 1945 legislation.

Marion county will be divided into four areas to be known as the Salem, Woodburn, Silverton and Stayton districts. The latter will take in much of the easterly portion of the county.

Fees for the tuberculosis and Bangs disease tests range from \$2.50 per single animal down to \$1 per head in herds of two to five animals and 50 cents per head in herds of more than six.

Fred W. Lange of Salem was reappointed county veterinarian and will have direct supervision over his deputies, A. W. Simmons of the Silverton district and John M. Hanrahan of Woodburn. No appointment was made for the Stayton district.

Judge Murphy said that Marion county had the largest number of dairy cattle in Oregon, 17,075 head reported in the 1940 agricultural census. Washington county was second with 16,746 head and Coos third with 15,189.

## County Workers To Get Vacations

Under adjustments made between the county court and members of county labor crews, workers after a year on the job will receive a week's vacation with pay or \$50. The county will also stand one way travel time to the job.

Each worker will be allowed 12 days' sick leave on a basis of one day a month until a worker gets 30 days. If an employee's credit reaches 30 days the accumulation stops. County Commissioner Roy J. Rice said the court was still figuring on the matter of wage readjustments.

## Houses for Adair Officers Sought

An appeal by the Marion county defense council to obtain houses, apartments and rooms for officers and enlisted men to be stationed at Camp Adair was sent out Friday. Many of the officers have expressed a desire to live in Salem.

The current campaign for housing accommodations will be continued until July 6. A listing bureau has been set up in the chamber of commerce.
