Hubbard Man With Busy **Photo Outfit**

CHALGROVE, Oxfordshire, England-The vast scale and importance of photographic recon-Germany is revealed in the hitherto unpublished records of the Seventh photographic reconnaissance group for which Cpl. Kenneth R. Luckey of Hubbard, Ore., is a photo laboratory technician.

Since March 28, 1943, when Col. James Hall of Ft. Worth, Tex., then commanding the group, flew over Paris on the first American pied Europe, the group's pilots, flying Spitfires and Lightnings, have made approximately 1,000,-000 reconnaissance photographs covering nearly 3,000,000 square miles of enemy territory in Denmark, Holland, Belgium, France, Italy and Russia. The job required more than 360 miles of film nine inches in width.




