Hubbard Man With Busy Photo Outfit

CHALGROVE, Oxfordshire, England—The vast scale and importance of photographic reconnaissance employed by the Eighth air force in the air war against Germany is revealed in the hitherto unpublished records of the Seventh photographic reconnaissance group for which Cpl. Kenneth R. Luckey of Hubbard, Ore., is a photo laboratory technician.

Since March 28, 1943, when Col. James Hall of Ft. Worth, Tex., then commanding the group, flew over Paris on the first American photo mission over German occupied Europe, the group's pilots, flying Spitfires and Lightnings, have made approximately 1,000,000 reconnaissance photographs covering nearly 3,000,000 square miles of enemy territory in Denmark, Holland, Belgium, France, Czechoslovakia, Germany, Austria, Italy and Russia. The job required more than 360 miles of film nine inches in width.

From these photographic negatives the group's laboratory produced nearly 5,000,000 prints for intelligence purposes.

Photographing the enemy's vital

war factories to provide information on which heavy bomber operations were based, and again after attacks to provide a record of the results, the Seventh photo group was the mighty Eighth air force's principal source of intelligence. In addition, the group covered enemy movement by land and sea, and provided photo maps which were invaluable to the ground forces in the invasion of Normandy and subsequent land operations.

Each photo aircraft carried from two to five large automatic aerial cameras, each capable of taking nine-inch square pictures on 100 to 200 foot rolls of film.

Coporal Luckey is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Orville Luckey, route 1, box 394, Hubbard, Ore. He entered the army Oct. 27, 1942, and has been in the European theatre of operations since February, 1944.

Monitor Sergeant Gets Discharge After Four Years

MONITOR—Sgt. Andrew Penne is at his home, four miles north of Monitor after receiving an honorable discharge at Fort Lewis June 28.

Sgt. Penne was inducted in February, 1941, received his basic training at Fort Lewis and Camp Hood, Tex., and was sent overseas in January, 1943. He went from Africa to Italy and was later sent to England in preparation for the invasion of Normandy, June 1944. He went in with the 25th wave and later saw action in France, Belgium and Germany.

His company was awarded the presidential citation for outstanding performance of duty in action near St. Jean De De Yve, France.

He was seriously wounded Jan. 12, 1945 in Katterberg, Germany, for which he received the purple heart and was hospitalized for three months in Belgium and France.

He was awarded the silver star for gallantry in action. While seriously wounded he crawled into a blazing tank destroyer which was full of ammunition and put out the fire with a fire extinguisher while subjected to intense artillery fire by the enemy, who were shelling the wounded.

After released from the hospital he rejoined his unit, the 899 tank destroyer battalion, a part of the ninth infantry division in the First Army under General Hodges. He wears the good conduct ribbon and the ETO ribbon with 7 battle stars.

Before inducted Penne was employed at the Crown Zellerbach Paper mills at Oregon City.

Lawrence Roth Home From Pacific Area

Ens. Lawrence D. Roth, USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan B. Roth, 729 West Seventh st., Albany, flew 25 missions as co-pilot of a navy photo-reconnaissance plane during his recent tour of duty in the Pacific.

Now returned on leave, he was attached to a photo squadron that flew specially equipped four-engine Liberators on long flights over enemy territory. Reconnaissance photographs that the squadron made of pre-invasion islands were credited with saving the lives of many American troops.

Vicksburg at Last Rejoins United States

VICKSBURG, Miss., July 4.—(AP)—A self-styled "dandy" today formally welcomed Vicksburg, the Gibraltar of the confederacy "back to the American tradition of a glorious July 4th."

He was Maj. Gen. Edward H. Brooks of Concord, N. H., commanding officer of the fourth service command, who said:

"It is especially significant that I, a dandy, should be the speaker at your first July 4th celebration in at least 82 years."

Vicksburg previously had not observed the holiday since the city's fall to federal forces July 4, 1863.

General Brooks spoke after reviewing a mile-long parade of army units, bands and floats which moved along magnolia and crepe myrtle bordered streets. The stars and stripes flew from every building.

"My appearance here," Gen. Brooks said, "is an indication, in spirit, of the unity of this city with other American communities—a unity which Vicksburg men already have, proved time and time again on fields of battle in this and other wars."

"There must be no bitterness at home," he added. "Our bitterness must be toward the national enemy."

General Brooks spoke after reviewing a mile-long parade of army units, bands and floats which moved along magnolia and crepe myrtle bordered streets. The stars and stripes flew from every building.

Byrnes Meets Diplomats in Starting Job

WASHINGTON, July 4.—(AP)—James F. Byrnes, the new secretary of state, shook hands in spirit today with much of the civilized world.

In a brief but colorful ceremony at his state department office, Byrnes greeted representatives of the diplomatic corps of the entire 55 nations on the United States diplomatic list.

Ambassadors, ministers, charges d'affaires filed through the office one by one, according to the order of their diplomatic precedence and got a warm handshake, a broad smile and a few words of greeting from the short-statured South Carolinian who spent his first day at his desk today.

As soon as the last one had left, the secretary of state sat down at his desk, grabbed a sheaf of papers—and went to work.

Latin-American Trainee Leaves For Long Drive

Raul Valle Rodas, Bolivian engineer with the Oregon state highway department the past year as a Pan-American trainee, leaves Salem today to drive down to Rio de Janeiro over the Pan-American highway.

Rodas has been instructor for the Spanish classes at the YMCA this past winter, with a record number of students enrolled. Approximately 125 adults have studied Spanish with him in the courses offered there. He came to Salem as the first trainee under the program to be accepted by the state highway commission.

A second Latin-American, Rolando Porras of Nicaragua, has been employed for a year's work.
