

Grain Futures Remain Firm; Some Rye Up

CHICAGO, July 9. (AP)—Most grain futures were firm today although wheat selling pushed westward near the close. December and May wheat closed fractionally higher, but July and September contracts were off slightly.

Some rye futures made fractional comebacks from last week's heavy losses, but the July contract, restricted to closing out operations, fluctuated over a 1/2 cent range and closed to 1/2 cent below last week's. Since the only trading permitted in July rye was selling or short covering purchases, small transactions changed prices greatly.

Oats were independently strong and corn and barley were firm most of the time. Bullish factors in all pits were unfavorable weather conditions in the corn growing and wheat harvesting areas, and reports that Europe will have the worst crop this year since the war started.

Wheat closed 1/2 cent lower to 1/2 higher than the previous finish. July \$1.65 1/2, corn was unchanged to 1/4 up, July \$1.18 1/2, oats were 1/4 up, July \$1.06 1/2, rye was down 1/4 to up 1/2, July \$1.44 1/2-\$1.44, and barley was unchanged to 1-22 higher, July \$1.15.

'Blue Chips' In Demand On N. Y. Mart

NEW YORK, July 9. (AP)—Investment demand for "blue chips" with actual or potential yields put specialized props under today's stock market.

American Telephone was favored from the start on the idea it was "behind" the market when the \$9 dividend was taken into consideration. This issue finished up six full points at 183 1/2, highest figure since 1937. AT&T bonds also were strong.

Sears Roebuck exemplified the "thinness" of the market, jumping a point or so between sales. It ended up 4 1/4 at 120 3/4. Revival of split-up talk was a factor here. Chrysler rose 2 1/2, Montgomery Ward 2 1/4 and US Steel and Bethlehem a point each.

Prices did better selectively at the opening but lagged thereafter. Many pivots closed at or near the day's best. Transfers of 800,000 shares compared with 960,000 Friday and were the smallest for a full session since April 10.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was up .7 of a point at 66.8, widest swing since May 28. Of 865 issues appearing, 503 advanced, 190 declined and 176 were unchanged.
