

Salem to Get Third Masonic Lodge July 17

Salem, on July 17, will become the only city in Oregon outside of Portland to have three Masonic lodges.

On that date Ainsworth Lodge, U. D., will be instituted by Fred W. Hartman, Portland, grand

master of Masons in Oregon. It is likely that there will be the largest gathering of distinguished Masons ever to assemble in Salem, officials of the organization said. Members of his official family accompanying the grand master will be Ed B. Beaty, Corvallis, deputy grand master; Walter M. Ranson, Eugene, senior grand warden; Lloyd McRae, Helix, junior grand warden; Harry D. Proudfoot, grand secretary, and a number of minor officers and past grand masters. Salem will contribute largely to this number, it having more past grand masters as either permanent or temporary residents than any other city in Oregon. These include Earl W. Snell, Leslie M. Scott, Walter C. Winslow, Percy R. Kelly, Arthur D. Hay, Milton L. Meyers and Rex W. Davis.

The new lodge, Ainsworth, receives the name of Salem's second Masonic lodge of pioneer days, which surrendered its charter, and perpetuates the name of a distinguished pioneer Mason who was one of the first members of Oregon's first lodge at Oregon City, Multnomah No. 1.

This will be the second Masonic lodge to be instituted within a period of 12 years. A lodge at Taft was instituted last month.

The dispensation for Ainsworth lodge was issued to Ernest R. Ringo, W. M., member of Salem lodge No. 4; Roy J. Stewart, S. W.,

Mrs. Gingrich's death followed an illness of about a year. She and her husband, the late Oscar Gingrich, came to Salem over 25 years ago from Salt Lake City, Utah, when he was connected with the YMCA as physical director. Later he was associated with the automobile business here.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Gingrich were active members of the First Congregational church, and were well known in musical circles of both their church and the town. She had a talent for art and dancing and for several years taught those subjects in Salem at the federal art center in the school administration building. She was also a member of Chadwick chapter, order of the Eastern Star and for about 15 years was a guardian of the Camp Fire girls. Recently she was employed by the Southern Pacific railway company.

Only survivor is a son, Oscar Gingrich, jr., of the U. S. navy at Portsmouth, Me., who will be unable to attend the services.

Gen. Mallon An Army Man For 37 Years

Maj. Gen. F. B. Mallon, who is the commanding general for the army ground forces replacement depot No. 4 at Camp Adair, is a native of New York. He entered the military service in 1908 and was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1912.

The general spent three years with the army of occupation in

Germany in World War I, and then went to the command and general staff school at Ft. Leavenworth, graduating in 1923. He was then assigned to demonstration troops at the infantry school at Ft. Benning, Ga., and in 1927 was graduated from the army war college. The next three years he spent with the war department general staff.

From 1930 until 1933 he was at the field artillery school at Ft. Sill, Okla., with infantry demonstration troops and then went to headquarters of the eighth corps area as assistant chief of staff for military intelligence, where he remained until 1937.

After two years with the 30th infantry regiment, first as executive officer and then as commanding officer, he rejoined the war department general staff where he stayed until January, 1942.

In January, 1942, he was made a brigadier general and placed in command of the infantry training center at Camp Joseph T. Robinson, Ark., which was his last assignment before organizing the army ground forces replacement depot at Ft. Meade.

In September, 1944, while at Ft. Meade he was made a major general.

Michael Nash Dies; Funeral Set Saturday

Funeral services for Michael A. Nash, Salem livestock buyer, who died at his home on Union street Thursday, will be held Saturday at 9 a. m. from St. Joseph's Catholic church. His death followed an illness that had kept him confined to his bed for the past 11 months.

Nash was the son of James and

Mary Nash and was born in LeSeur county, Minnesota, in 1886. He came to Oregon 57 years ago, first settling at Amity and coming to Salem in 1897. His marriage to Rosa Dancer occurred in McMinnville, Sept. 24, 1890.

Survivors include the widow; two sons, Elroy and Elma Nash, both of Salem; two sisters, Maria Agga Smith and Evelyn A. Nash, both of Salem; two brothers, James K. Nash of Salem and Firmin T. Nash of Macleay; and a grandson, Thomas E. Nash of Salem.
