Sergeant Clark Hunts for Boar In Nazi Forest

WITH THE 70th INFANTRY DIVISION IN GERMANY—On a thousand-year-old royal hunting preserve along the scenic Rhine river gorge, Sgt. Howard T. Clark, route three, box 765, Salem, Ore., took part in a wild boar hunt.

A member of the 274th infantry regiment, of the 70th "Trail-blazer" division, he used the same weapon with which he fought in the 274th's battle campaigns in Alsace, Lorraine and the Saarland.

Along with two score other soldiers, the local serviceman was on one of the series of three-day outings being conducted in the regiment's recreational program pending redeployment.

Scene of the hunt was a series of wooded hills and valleys reserved for the sport of King Carl the Great in 928, during the time when the ferocious boars were hunted with spears. Other German rulers, and the church government at one time, controlled the preserve until it was converted into a national park in the present century.

Some of the animals bagged were fine specimens.

Pvt. O. G. Tucker In Philippines on Cannoneer Duty

SILVERTON — Pvt. Orvall G. Tucker, husband of Mrs. Alma Tucker, Silvertown, has arrived in the Philippines and has been assigned to the 32nd Red Arrow infantry division.

The 32nd has been in the Southwest Pacific since May, 1942. At Buna, New Guinea, it gave the U.S. its first offensive victory against the Japanese in the Pacific. It has a total of 580 combat days. Tucker takes his place in this team as a cannoneer in Battery A, 126th Field artillery battalion.

Tucker attended Aumsville high school and was employed in a dry cleaning establishment in Salem before entering the army in August, 1944. His mother, Mrs. Mary Tucker, lives at 2045 N. Church st., Salem.

Capt. William C. Dyer arrived in the states Tuesday from the European theatre of war, where he has been for 11 months as commanding officer of Company F, 415th Infantry of the 104th division. He phoned his wife, the former Clara Belle Burnside, and his mother, Mrs. William Connell Dyer, on Wednesday from New York. He is now en route to Fort Lewis and will arrive in Salem next week on a 30-day leave.

Captain Dyer entered the service in February, 1942. In July of 1942 he was sent to infantry officer's school at Fort Benning and following his graduation in October was assigned to the 104th Timberwolf division at Camp Adair.

He was recently awarded the Silver Star medal for gallantry in action during a night attack on Sandersdorf, near Bitterfeld, Germany, April 17, 1945. His previous decorations include the Combat Infantryman badge, the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star medal. He holds three campaign stars for northern France, the Rhineland, and central Germany, many.

SILVERTON — Lt. (jg) Raymond Hogen, USNR, of 414 Jersey st., Silvertown, Ore., has returned from a tour of duty in the Caribbean, where he served with the navy's patrol bombing squadron 214.

Using big Mariner flying boats, the squadron ranged over thousands of miles of ocean on convoy coverages and anti-submarine sweeps. Pilots and aircrews frequently found boredom their chief enemy during long hours of wearying routine patrols. Although one plane was forced down, its crew was saved and the squadron lost no personnel during its twenty months of duty—a reflection on the skill of both flying and ground crews.

The navy aviator is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl W. Hogen of the Silvertown address.

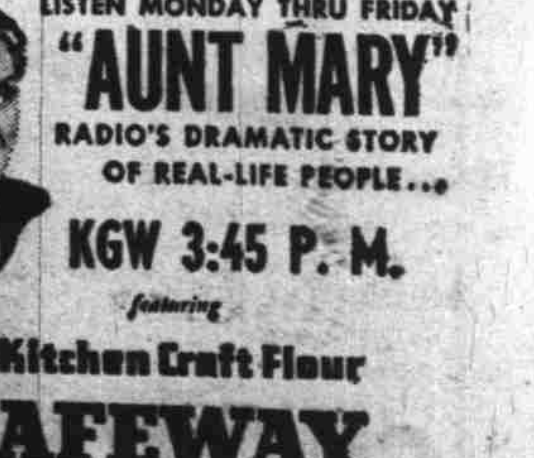

Expansion of Bus Service Contemplated

An expansion of intra-city bus service, both as to hours of operation and routes, is contemplated for Salem when the war conditions permit, A. L. Schneider of Portland, general manager of Oregon Motor Stages, told The Statesman Thursday.

The stage line was purchased by new management July 1. Twenty-six new buses have been contracted for Salem and Eugene, any may start becoming available by October 1, Schneider said.

Two additional roundtrips daily to Newport from Salem will start Monday, it was announced, and seven more buses will serve Camp Adair beginning tomorrow. The army is matching bus for bus from its motor pool every time the stage line adds a new one for Adair.

Schneider said the new firm contemplated no changes in methods of operation "but we're going to have good equipment and good service—a service adaptable to the public needs."
