A crew of diesel-sprayers who cover Multnomah county once a week is finding it much easier to control the culex variety of mosquito, which breeds in pools and drainage ditches, Gavin said. The spraying will be continued through August, he reported.

Flood-water mosquitoes, unusually prevelent in this region, are fast dying off, Gavin said,


