- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup flaked tuna fish and oil (7 oz. can)
- 1 tablespoon grated onion
- 1/2 tablespoons finely chopped parsley
- 1/4 cup finely chopped celery
- 1 cup coarse crumbs
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- Dash of pepper
- 1/2 medium green peppers
- Scald milk. Add remaining ingredients except peppers. Remove stems and seeds from peppers. Parboil for 2 minutes. Drain, fill with tuna fish mixture. Place in greased custard cups and bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 30 minutes. Serves 6.
