### Springfield Mill Shut by Union Dispute

SPRINGFIELD, July 20 (AP)—The huge Springfield Plywood corporation plant, with more than 9,000,000 board feet of war orders on its books, was closed today by a jurisdictional dispute.

AFL employees picketed the plant this morning.

The union claims to represent 175 of the mill's 300 employees and protests the CIO contract under which the plant operates. The national labor relations board has approved the strike vote, but would not approve a bargaining election because the CIO contract is industry-wide. The local AFL members are not considered an appropriate bargaining group.

The corporation wired the national labor board that it "will comply to the fullest extent... to maintain production of vitally-needed war material."

CIO wired a similar promise.

No violence was reported on picket lines, and the few men continuing work were not molested. The company hoped to get enough men to continue operation. AFL also ordered off its firemen, leaving the plant without adequate fire protection.

The Springfield Plywood corporation produces 3,000,000 board feet monthly, most of which goes to the armed forces.
