
Washington's bid for top spot in the loop got another setback when Cleveland's Ed Klieman gave only five hits to best Johnny Niggeling 2-1.

CHICAGO, July 23 -(P)- Bill Gilbert of Cincinnati, O.; one-time Big Ten champion, and Bill Hyndman, long-hitting Philadel-phian, today led the carly qualifiers for the all-American ama-teur golf tournament at the Tam O'Shanter Country club, to be played along with the \$60,000 all-American open. Both came in with scores of 71, one under par, over the rugged course where three tournaments will be held at the same time later this week.

Hyndman's performance was the more spectacular of the two as the field sought 12 places in the finals of the event. He was out in 38, two over par, and came back with a three under par 33 to tie Gilbert. The latter had a 35-36 for his 71.

Gilbert, recently discharged from the marines after three years' service, had Flight Officer Frank Stranahan of FL Myers, Fla., as a playing partner. He fired a 72. Behind Stranahan were Arnold Minkley, Miami, Fla., vet-eran, and Art Doering, Denver, Colo., who led the amateurs in the 1942 meet, with 73's. L. Lee Shep-herd of Pittsburgh and Paul Sparks of St. Louis had scores of 74.

Among today's contestants was Sgt. Joe Louis, world heavyweight champion. He shot a 77, but appeared out of the running as most of the field came in.


