Truck Lines Slate Joint Action Plan

PORTLAND, July 23. (AP)—Miles of empty hauls and duplication of service will be eliminated by seven Oregon trucking companies under a joint action plan announced today by the office of defense transportation.

Five large companies will funnel part loads to the K. C. truck lines, Hubbard, and the Woodburn truck line. These two companies will build up full loads at transfer points for the Heavy Haulers. ODT estimates the plan will save 25,000 operating miles a year.

Other companies participating: Willamette Valley Transfer and Salem-Portland Motor Freight companies, Portland; Reimann Truck service and Salem Navigation companies, Salem; Pierce Auto Freight Lines, Inc., Medford.
