QUICK ITALIAN SPAGHETTI WITH SALAMI

1/2 pound salami Lard or drippings for browning

1 cup onions, chopped 1 cup fresh mushrooms, sliced 1 tablespoon flour

1½ cups tomato juice 1 cup water 11/2 teaspoons Worcestershire

sauce 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper

2 tablespoons parsley, minced ¼ green pepper, chopped 6-8 ounces uncooked spaghetti

Cut half the salami into very thin slices and grind or chop the remainder. Brown onions and mushrooms lightly in lard or drippings; blend in flour, and add chopped salami. Add tomato juice, diluted with water, and seasonings. Simmer 25 minites. Add parsley and green pepper and simmer five minutes more. Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water, and serve with sauce and sliced meat, as desired.




