"THE YOUNG IDEA" By Mossler \$19,890 Paid From Car Accident Fund



Logan, oh Logan—you will come back for the baby's sake and mine!

The state department said Monday that claims totaling \$19,890 were paid out of the motor accident fund in the year ended June 30, and that \$79,547 was paid out of the fund since it was created four years ago.

The fund, used to pay hospitals, doctors and ambulance companies for care of indigent traffic accident victims, has a balance of \$198,674. It was financed by a tax of 25 cents a year on drivers' licenses.

Amounts paid out during the year ended June 30 were \$18,213 to hospitals, \$3664 to doctors, and \$12 to an ambulance company. The average claim per hospital was \$398, and the average doctor claim was \$159.

A recipe comes from the national livestock and meat board for a main dish that uses salami and is on the menu for today.

- Cucumber tomato salad Italian spaghetti Zucchini squash Cottage pudding Lemon sauce

QUICK ITALIAN SPAGHETTI WITH SALAMI

- 1/2 pound salami Lard or drippings for browning 1 cup onions, chopped 1 cup fresh mushrooms, sliced 1 tablespoon flour 1 1/2 cups tomato juice 1 cup water 1 1/2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper 2 tablespoons parsley, minced 1/4 green pepper, chopped 6-8 ounces uncooked spaghetti

Cut half the salami into very thin slices and grind or chop the remainder. Brown onions and mushrooms lightly in lard or drippings; blend in flour, and add chopped salami. Add tomato juice, diluted with water, and seasonings. Simmer 25 minutes. Add parsley and green pepper, and simmer five minutes more. Cook spaghetti in boiling salted water, and serve with sauce and sliced meat, as desired.

Hotel Lobbies Crowded With Adair Soldiers

Hotel lobbies and even the new city hall clubroom built by and for the city firemen's and policemen's association became informal dormitories the past weekend for soldiers unable to secure beds elsewhere. Thirty private homes were opened to men from Adair; at YMCA, St. Joseph's hall and the Youth Center a total of 400 cots and beds were provided, and every hotel room was full.

Hundreds returned to the camp early Sunday morning, unable to find a place in Salem to sleep. Restaurants were filled Saturday and Sunday, but many ceased sales of meat early. The USO drew 558 men during the two-day period, while the Youth Center attracted between 2400 and 2500.
