

### Bluish Monday Tinge Covers Stock Market

NEW YORK, July 23. (AP)—A bluish Monday tinge enveloped the stock market today and leaders generally sold down fractions to two more points in relatively slow dealings.

Many customers trimmed accounts on the persistent idea of a sudden Japanese surrender would seriously upset domestic economy, at least temporarily. Others stood aside to await British election results due Thursday and news from the Potsdam parley. Passage by congress of the reconversion tax relief act was helpful.

Investment sentiment was buoyed to some extent by the quick sale of American Telephone's \$175,000,000, 2 1/2 per cent debentures at par, one of the largest transactions on record. A.T. & T. common, though, ended off 1/4 at 17 3/4.

Transfers of 750,000 shares compared with 650,000 Friday.

The Associated Press 60-stock average was off .6 of a point at 64.2.

Pacific Mills improved following a lifted dividend but slipped at the last for a net drop of 1/4 at 50 1/4.

Prominent in the minus ranks were Santa Fe, Southern Pacific, U. S. Steel, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, Texas Co., Kennecott, Goering and Dow Chemical. Small gains were retained by Eastman Kodak, Sears Roebuck and Pacific Tin.

### Grain Futures Trading Has Erratic Day

CHICAGO, July 23. (AP)—Grain futures trading was a mixed up affair today due to closing out operations in the July deliveries, with today the final day of trading in all these contracts.

Shorts in July rye attempted to cover and found little offerings. The July price pushed upward 4 to 4 1/2 cents a bushel to close at \$1.59 1/2 to \$1.60 1/2, a new seasonal high.

Meanwhile liquidation in July wheat pushed that price down 2 1/2 to 3 1/4 cents, and the loss affected other wheat deliveries adversely. There also was some hedge selling of wheat, although brokers said this was not large considering the heavy southwestern arrivals, which included 1864 cars at Kansas City.

Deferred deliveries of other grains also were down.

Wheat closed 3 1/4 cents lower to 1/2 higher. July \$1.63 1/2-\$1.62 3/4, corn was unchanged to 1/4 off, July \$1.18 1/2, oats were 1/2 higher to 1/2 lower, July 65 1/2-66 1/2, rye was up 4 1/2 to down 2 cents, July \$1.59 1/2-\$1.60 1/2, and barley was up 1/2 cents to down 1/2, July \$1.22.

### Hunt Foods Branches Into New Fields

LOS ANGELES, July 23. (Special)—Hunt Foods, Inc. has announced the acquisition of stock in the Rocky Mountain Packing corporation, the largest independent canning concern in Utah, from Harold B. Fabian, president of the corporation, and a group associated with him. Four new directors out of a total of seven have been elected to the board.

This is in line with Hunt's announced policy of gradually acquiring additional interests in the general food field. Rocky Mountain Packing corporation specializes in canned peas and tomatoes, as well as in some varieties of frozen foods. The corporation has four plants in Utah and is one of the largest processors in the state. Frank Gimlin will continue as general manager.

As a result of this action, Hunt Foods, Inc. extends its interests into two new fields, frozen foods and canned peas.

### Lt. Schiess Hits Nip Cruiser, Downs 3 Planes

Lt. (jg) Edward O. Schiess, USNR, 23, 1343 S. Commercial, carrier-based navy fighter-bomber pilot, scored a direct bomb hit on a Jap light cruiser and shot down three enemy planes during the Okinawa campaign the navy made known this week.

Lieutenant Schiess flew a Chance-Vought Corsair fighter-bomber from the deck of an Essex class carrier attached to Vice Admiral Marc A. Mitscher's famed task force 58.

He dropped a bomb squarely amidships of an Agano class light cruiser and helped sink that warship during the fleet action of April 7 between Okinawa and Ryushu. He dove through intense anti-aircraft fire to drop his bomb.

The Salem pilot exploded an Oscar fighter over Kure harbor, Honshu, on May 19. He knocked down a Ju 52 bomber attempting a suicide attack on task force 58 off Okinawa April 12, and he got a Zeke fighter from a large group of enemy planes attempting another suicide attack at Okinawa May 4.

His air group shot down 220 Jap planes in the Okinawa campaign and wrecked 72 more on the ground.

### Lester Coons Killed

T/Sgt. Lester Coons, who, as shown on Sunday army casualty lists, was killed in action in the Philippines, was an out-of-state man who had been 12 years in the United States army and was once stationed at Camp Adair. Harry McKee of Jefferson is listed as a friend but Coons had no relatives in this state, McKee believes.

**WITH THE AMERICAN INFANTRY DIVISION IN THE PHILIPPINES**—(Delayed)—Roy W. Gable, son of Mrs. Mary Swartz of RFD two, West Salem, Ore., has been promoted from private first class to technician fifth grade while serving with a veteran anti-tank company of the 182nd infantry on Cebu. Overseas 38 months, Cpl. Gable has served in the Fiji Islands, Espiritu Santo, New Hebrides, Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Leyte and Cebu. He is entitled to wear the combat infantryman's badge, the Asiatic-Pacific campaign ribbon with two battle stars and the Philippine liberation ribbon with star.

### ABOARD THE USS COLORADO IN THE PACIFIC—Jack L. Beeson, seaman 1/c, USN, son of Mrs. Pearl Buzzard, route one, Lebanon, Ore., fought aboard this battleship for 60 days and nights at Okinawa.

The Colorado expended more ammunition there in support of ground troops than in any of the previous occupation and bombardment operations in which she participated. Task force and ground unit commanders showed numerous "well done" messages on the officers and men for the effectiveness of their fire.
