Sugarless Pickle Recipe Given

Here's a request recipe, which, frankly, we haven't tried. We suggest that you go a bit easy on the saccharin, tasting the brine of saccharin tastes bitter.

It is 500 times sweeter than sugar, 1/4 - grain tablet tablet equals a teaspoon of sugar in sweetness, 1 teaspoon of powdered saccharin equals approximately 5 teaspoons sugar.

PICKLES WITHOUT SUGAR 1 gallon vinegar

11/2 teaspoons saccharin 1/2 cup salt

2 tablespoons mustard 2 teaspoons powdered alum

Mix dry ingredients and add to vinegar. Place cucumbers in jars. Cover with liquid and seal cold. These pickles will keep indefinitely. Fox mixed pickles add cauliflower, celery, pimientos and spices. If a few are to be made at a time, mix the liquid and seal, using as needed.

Discard garlic clove and add to tuna fish mixture. Mix thoroughly and serve immediately.
