# Sugarless Pickle Recipe Given

Here's a request recipe, which, frankly, we haven't tried. We suggest that you go a bit easy on the saccharin, tasting the brine for sweetness. An over amount of saccharin tastes bitter. It is 500 times sweeter than sugar. 1/4-grain tablet tablet equals a teaspoon of sugar in sweetness, 1 teaspoon of powdered saccharin equals approximately 5 teaspoons sugar.

**PICKLES WITHOUT SUGAR**  
1 gallon vinegar  
1 1/2 teaspoons saccharin  
1/2 cup salt  
2 tablespoons mustard  
2 teaspoons powdered alum  
Mix dry ingredients and add to vinegar. Place cucumbers in jars. Cover with liquid and seal cold. These pickles will keep indefinitely. For mixed pickles add cauliflower, celery, pimiento and spices. If a few are to be made at a time, mix the liquid and seal, using as needed.

**SPAGHETTI WITH TUNA FISH SAUCE**  
8-ounce package spaghetti  
1 clove garlic  
1 8-ounce can of tuna fish  
1 onion, chopped  
1 small can tomato paste  
5 cups water  
Salt and pepper  
Drain oil from tuna fish and heat oil in a heavy skillet. Add onion and saute until a light brown. Add tomato paste. Mix well and add water. Cook down to about 2 1/2 cups. Add tuna fish and seasonings and heat through. Meanwhile cook spaghetti for nine minutes in two quarts boiling water to which the garlic clove has been added. Drain. Discard garlic clove and add to tuna fish mixture. Mix thoroughly and serve immediately.

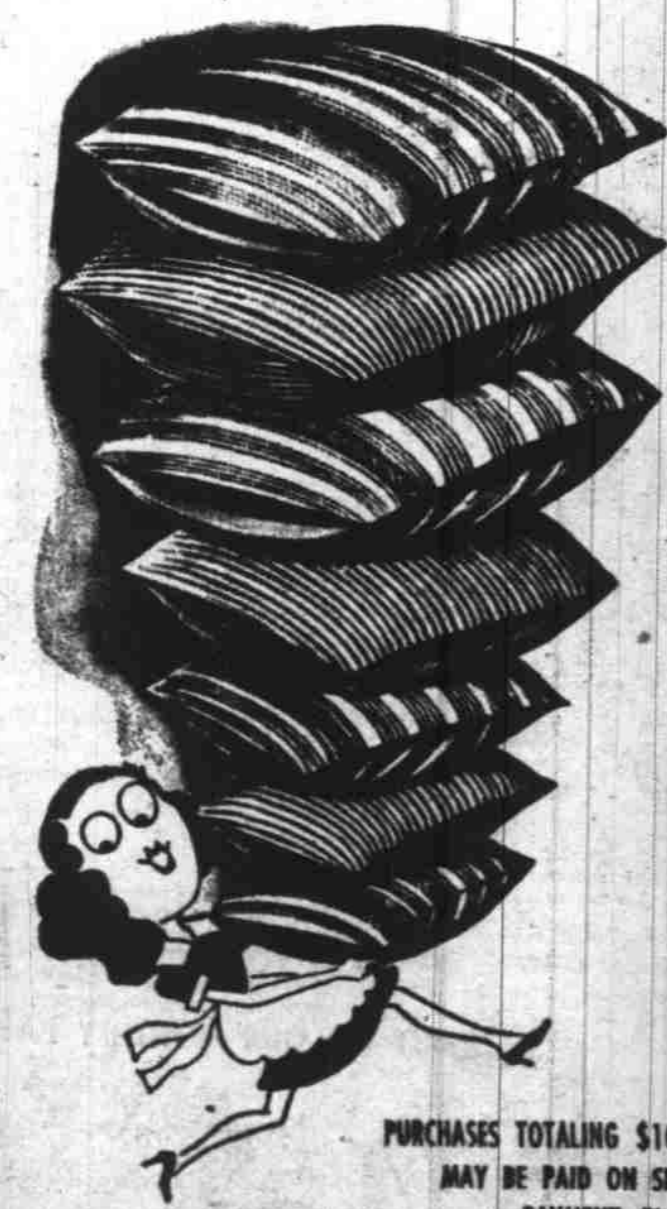

**SUGAR:**  
Book 4 — Stamp 26 valid for five pounds through August 31.  
**SHOES:**  
Book 2 — Airplane stamps 1, 2 and 3 valid indefinitely. New stamp due August 1.  
**GASOLINE:**  
A 16 coupons good everywhere for six gallons each through September 21.  
**FUEL OIL:**  
Period 1-3 (incl) coupons valid through August 31.

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
