WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 -(AP)-The agriculture department took another step today to increase production of sugar by raising subsidy payments to sugar cane and sugar beet processors.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson yesterday announced an increase in the subsidy payments for producers or growers of sugar cane or sugar beets. Sugar beet processors of the

crop will be paid a subsidy of 18 cents a hundred pounds of refined sugar compared with 121/2 cents last year, to offset increased production costs.
