Versatile

Eggplants Make Main Dishes

Eggplant, now in the market in small numbers and soon to be here in quantity, is the basis for many a main dish.

Eggplant has always been fried in many families, who seem to think that the vegetable is only suited to this type of cooking. But eggplant is a favorite vegetable in Armenian cooking, and appears in many ways.

Eggplant may become an attractive appearing and delightfully flavored main dish when boiled for awhile (with skin on) then halved and center scooped out with a spoon or French ball cutter. The pulp is mixed with egg, crumbs, cheese and seasonings, moistened with milk and baked until done, in a pan with a little water (around an hour or less).

Eggplant can be scalloped, too, to make a good main dish. Cook partially, run through a ricer, mix with egg, milk, breadcrumbs and seasonings, put into casserole and cover with crumbs and grated cheese, bake until brown. Sliced eggplant can be dipped in a batter and fried in deep fat. Here's another dish to use eggplant:

- EGGPLANT SOUFFLE**
2 tablespoons butter or substitute
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup milk
1 cup cheese
3/4 cup breadcrumbs
Onion, catsup
2 eggs beaten separately
1 eggplant
Cook eggplant, mash. Make cream sauce with butter, flour and milk. Mix with other ingredients, bake 45 minutes at 375.

Ground lamb made into cakes becomes part of an extra fine main dish when cooked Armenian style. Peel and boil eggplant until partially done, make cuts almost through the vegetable, and put the seasoned lamb cakes in these slits. Put the eggplant in a pan and bake until meat is done. Good with tomato sauce.
