HALIBUT AU GRATIN
1 1/2 lbs. halibut filets
1 1/2 cups milk
1 tablespoon flour
1/2 teaspoon mustard
1/4 teaspoon marjoram
1 teaspoon onion, minced
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup grated cheese
Grease a shallow dish. Pour the milk in the bottom of the dish and sprinkle the flour and mustard over it and stir thoroughly. Lay the halibut filets in the milk mixture and sprinkle the marjoram, onion and salt over them. Dot with butter, cover with grated cheese and bake in a hot oven (400 degrees) about 30 minutes.
