Wheat held within rather narrow limits after an opening dip of around a cent which was quickly corrected. There was less aggressive buying by commission houses with southwestern connections, and some indication of lighter purchases of cash hard winter wheat by the commodity credit corporation.

At the close wheat was unchanged to 1/4 lower than yesterday's close, September \$1.64%. Corn was 1/2 to 1/8 higher, December \$1.14. Oats were % to 11/4 higher, September 58%-59. Rye was % to 11/4 lower, September \$1.43%-1/2. Barley was unchanged to 11/2 higher, September \$1.031/4.

Market Shows Slight Advance

NEW YORK, Aug. 14-(P)-Rails, steels and utilities regained some of their recent losses and other selected stocks advanced fractions to around 2 points in today's quiet market dealings as people around the world anxiously awaited Japan's replay to allied surrender terms.

Dealings were not heavy. Volume totaled 910,000 shares against 970,000 yesterday. Of 865 issues dealt in, 512 advanced, 189 declined and 164 were unchanged. The Associated Press 60-stock composite rose .3 of a point to 64.6 on gains in industrials, rails and utilities.
