The number of policies becoming claims in the first six months was 2677 which compares with 2239 in the corresponding period of the previous year and 1865 in the first half of 1941.

"In spite of a reduction this year in the civilian death rate, the aggregate of death benefit payments has continued high largely because of increased war fatalities," Holgar J. Johnson, president of the institute, said in announcing the figures.
