WINS PROMOTION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (Special)—The war department today announced that Leonard Reimann, AC, of 1275 Fairmount, Salem, Ore., had been promoted from second lieutenant to first lieutenant.

T/S Waldemar L. Krause, husband of Mrs. W. L. Krause of Salem and formerly a teacher in the Detroit, Ore., school, has returned from Europe with the 8th Infantry division and is to be trained at Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., for occupational duties in the Orient.

HELPS IN LAST SALVO

Douglas F. Coker, BM 2/c, son of Mrs. Irene Coker, 1127 Hines st., is a member of the crew of the USS St. Paul which fired the war's last salvo at Japs. Coker has been in the navy for the last five years.

GUAM, Aug. 16—Lt. (jg) Melvin T. Hurley, MC, USNR, whose wife Mrs. Martha S. Hurley, lives at 425 N. 14th st., Salem, Ore., serves aboard the USS Bon Homme Richard, one of 20 aircraft carriers in an armada of 133 combat ships that aided in forcing the surrender of Japan. The Bon Homme Richard, identified by Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, as one of the ships of the line under Admiral William F. Halsey, commander, 3rd fleet, sent waves of planes from her flight deck to bombard Jap cities, factories and airfields in the final days of the war.

WITH THE 32D INFANTRY DIVISION IN NORTHERN LUZON, P. I.—PFC William Frank, Sumlivity, Ore., veteran of three bloody campaigns and 40 months overseas, is returning home under the army's redeployment program. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Frank, he was a cannoner in Battery C, 120th Field Artillery Battalion, a part of the veteran 32d "Red Arrow" Infantry Division which was the first full division to cross the Pacific and the first to fight the Japs.

Arriving off Japanese shores at a time when the enemy homeland already was reeling under devastating carrier-plane blows this destroyer not only participated in the showdown scene as a screening unit for successive air attacks but pumped its own main-battery shells into the Jap targets.

ABOARD THE USS IOWA OFF HONSHU —(Delayed)—Raymond Leo Tucker, 31, seaman, second class, USNR, whose wife, Wilma, lives at Bandon, Ore., fought aboard this 45,000-ton battleship when she and other 3rd fleet battleships, cruisers and destroyers staged a daring midnight bombardment of industrial targets on this main Japanese island, just 70 miles from Tokyo. Since she was launched, nine months after Pearl Harbor, the Iowa has taken part in virtually all naval action in the island-to-island conquest of Jap-held Pacific territory.

EGLIN FIELD, Fla., Aug. 27—First Lt. Raleigh Wirth of Salem, Ore., is now stationed at the army air forces proving ground command, Eglin Field, Fla., where he was transferred from Santa Monica, Calif. A veteran of eight months service in the southwest Pacific where he completed 30 combat missions.
