Development of Port of Portland Urged

PORTLAND, Aug. 29—(P)—Immediate steps toward development of Portland's port was urged today by the Oregon Building Congress. In a recommendation to Mayor

Earl Riley, the congress described the first goal as modernizing facilities to permit cheaper movement of freight between docks and rail, truck, or air terminals. "Growth of Oregon depends greatly on Portland developing a modern port," said the congress.

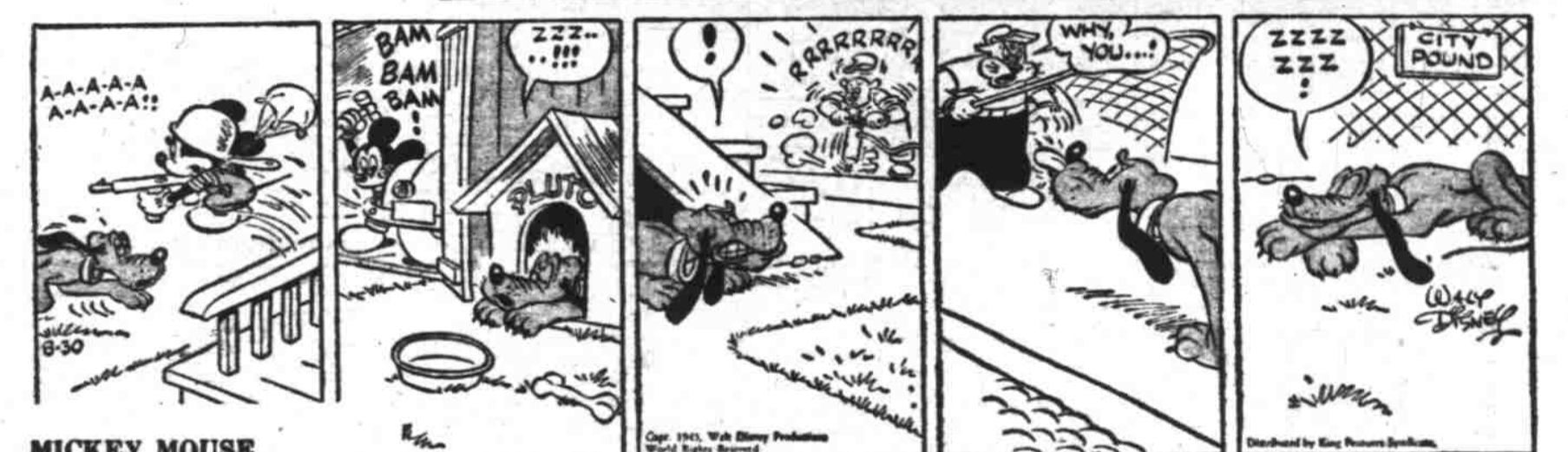
