Noon Food Service Ready at Senior, Junior High Schools And 3 Elementary Buildings

Cafeteria service will be provided students who attend senior high school and either of the two junior high schools, and a hot lunch program will be in vogue at the Bush, Richmond and Highland elementary schools, Superintendent of Schools Frank B. Bennett has announced.

The service at the senior high school is declared as good or better than could be expected at a public cafeteria and offers an excellent choice of foods and full cafeteria service. Around 600 to 700 students take advantage of the nutritious food every day, Bennett said, and thus enable the cafeteria to more than pay for itself.

An average meal there, including a plate meal, drink and simple dessert, costs around 35 or 40 cents. More expensive items are provided, as well as the low cost sundries, such as ice cream, soft drinks and desserts to supplement the lunches that some of the students prefer to bring from home.

At the junior high school there are two types of service—students there have the option of a full meal at the school or can supplement their home packed lunches. Not nearly so much range in the selection of foods is provided at either Leslie or Parrish, as less adequate baking facilities are a handicap to more complete service, Bennett added.

In the three elementary schools, an effort is made to serve as balanced a meal as possible. However, no choice is provided in the main dish. An average hot lunch consists of a heavy stew or soup, or baked macaroni and cheese or similar entree, vegetables, fruit and milk. This costs the pupil around 10 cents per day, as the schools are associated with the federal hot lunch program.

Youngsters who live near the elementary schools are discouraged from eating their lunch here except on special occasions. Facilities are inadequate to serve a large number. The pupils who do not live near the school or who come in from outlying districts such as those who come from Capitol into Garfield school are encouraged to take advantage of this program, as are pupils whose parents are both working.

Three full-time workers are employed to prepare the foods at the senior high and are assisted at meal time by students who spend part of their lunch period

working in exchange for the noon meal. At Parrish and Leslie, one full time and one part time worker is on duty. The same situation obtains at the three elementary schools.

The most difficult part of the program during the war years has been the lack of sugar and some meats. Bennett pointed out. A number of canning projects have been sponsored at the community cannery to put up, berries, fruits and vegetables during the summer so that a complete stock is assured when school begins.

U. S. Landings On Kyushu Set

ABOARD USS DAVID WILLIAM TAYLOR, off Kyushu, Tuesday, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The first seaborne American landing on Kyushu was in prospect today as this destroyer and the USS Bradford, escorted by American mine sweepers and guided by Japanese naval pilots, led a convoy of six LSTs (landing ships, tanks) past Kamin mountain into Kagoshima bay.

American forces from these six ships were ready to disembark south of Takisu, near Manoya airfield, the most important in southern Kyushu.

The Taylor, flagship of Capt. Clyde M. Jensen, Peru, Ill., squadron commander, is captained by Cmdr. Francis O'Connor Fletcher, Jr., Asheville, N. C.

Army Hospital Escapee Killed By Cyanide Gas

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 3.—(AP)—Two soldier-prisoners out of five who escaped from Baxter general hospital last night made unwise choice in seeking refuge with the result that one was dead today and another had been captured.

Only one remains at large since two were captured immediately after the break. The body of one of the men was found in a house being fumigated with cyanide gas. He was identified by Capt. E. H. Baker, public relations officer at Baxter, as Pvt. Robert Geese, 20, Springfield, Ill. Baker said he had entered the place by breaking a window. Doors of the place were posted with warnings.

Another of the escapees was captured later today when, seeking water, he knocked at the farm house of Al Canwell, a deputy sheriff. He was Pvt. Marcial Licon, 24, Flagstaff, Ariz.

The five prisoners were from Fort Missoula, Mont., disciplinary barracks where they were serving terms of a year or more. Captain Baker said their offense and the length of their terms were not on record here.

The only man of the five still at large is Ranson Feltus, 24, Grand Rapids, Minn.
