U.S. Supports USSR Claims To Kuriles

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Secretary of State Byrnes indicated today that the United States would support Russia's claim to certain islands north of Japan and disclosed that the Big Three had discussed the subject at Yalta.

The United States is not opposed to the position of Russia on the Kurile islands and the southern half of Sakhalin island, Byrnes told his news conference.

When asked if Premier Stalin had mentioned at Yalta that the islands formerly belonged to Russia, Byrnes said he did not want to discuss that.

In a V-J day broadcast, Stalin told the Russian people Sunday that the Soviet Union would regain southern Sakhalin and the Kurile islands, which went to Japan in the war of 1904.

Whiskey Ration May Be Modified

SEATTLE, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Rear Adm. Luther E. Gregory said here today that some brands of blended whiskey may be taken off the ration list in the near future.

The liquor control board chairman said also that gin was taken off the restricted list Saturday on a trial basis and "may show us how much further we can go."

"We would like to do away with all liquor rationing as soon as possible," the admiral said, "but because of the shortage in scotch and straight American whiskey, this probably will be out of the question for some time."

Russians Snare Easy Win Over U.S. in Chess

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Russia's chess team easily defeated a United States team 15 to 4 1/2, in their international four day radio match which ended tonight.

A silver plaque of victory was presented to Pavel Mikhailov, Soviet consul general of New York, by Maurice Wertheim, chairman of the match committee, who challenged the Russians to a return match.

Needing just one point for victory as play opened today, the Russians picked up 5 1/2 winning four matches and tying three.

Brownlee Resigns As OPA Executive

WASHINGTON, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The resignation of James F. Brownlee as deputy OPA administrator "on doctors' orders" was announced tonight by administrator Chester Bowles.

Bowles named Jerome M. Ney of Fort Smith, Ark., now director of the consumer goods price division, to succeed Brownlee.

Czechs Claim German Gold

LONDON, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Well informed sources said tonight the Czech government was expected shortly to present a 6,000,000 pound (about \$24,000,000) claim to Great Britain and the United States against the allied-captured German gold reserve.

These officials said the question might be brought up by Czech Prime Minister Zdenko Fierlinger and Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk, who are expected to arrive by plane tomorrow to discuss trade agreements aimed at restoring Czechoslovakia's peacetime economy.

The gold which the Czechs reportedly will seek was on deposit by Czechoslovakia with the international bank at Basle, Switzerland, in 1939 and was turned over to Germany when it took over management of Czechoslovakia.
