Last Carrier Launched by Tacoma Yards

TACOMA, Sept. 6-(AP)—The last of the huge aircraft carriers being built here in the Todd-Pacific yards under the current naval contracts, the U.S.S. Tinnian, was launched late yesterday.

The sponsor, Miss Grace Douglas Woods of Rear Adm. E. L. Woods (MC) USN, crashed the traditional champagne against the prow. She was attended by her mother and had as her guests Mrs. Robert Walkinshaw and daughter, Miss Valerie of Seattle.

The Tinnian is the last of the 74 ships built at these yards during the war and the 19th ship of the big Commencement Bay series. Besides these large carriers constructed here have been five cargo vessels, two transports, five oil tankers, 37 baby flattops, four seaplane tenders and two destroyer tenders.

Work on ships now outfitting and to be brought here from Seattle for finishing will keep the yard busy until June of next year, according to announcement made recently by company spokesmen.

Mexican Said To Be Suicide

Alfonso Gutierrez Alvarez, Mexican national who was employed at the W. W. Graham hop yard, was found dead in the woods behind the yard Thursday, hanging from a maple tree with a sash cord around his neck.

County sheriff Denver Young said the man apparently was a suicide. He had been missing from the camp there since 6:30 a. m. Thursday and his roommates said that he had been despondent over pains in his head and was afraid of a deranged mental condition.

Deputy Sheriff Harlan Bones and deputy coroner Richard F. Smart found the body, which was taken to the coroner's office in Salem.

Boyington to Arrive Today

On hand to greet him will be the surviving members of Boyington's famed "black sheep" squadron, with which Boyington made marine corps history in the South Pacific. Boyington, who had 28 planes

to his credit, was shot down in flames and badly wounded over Rabaul in 1944.
