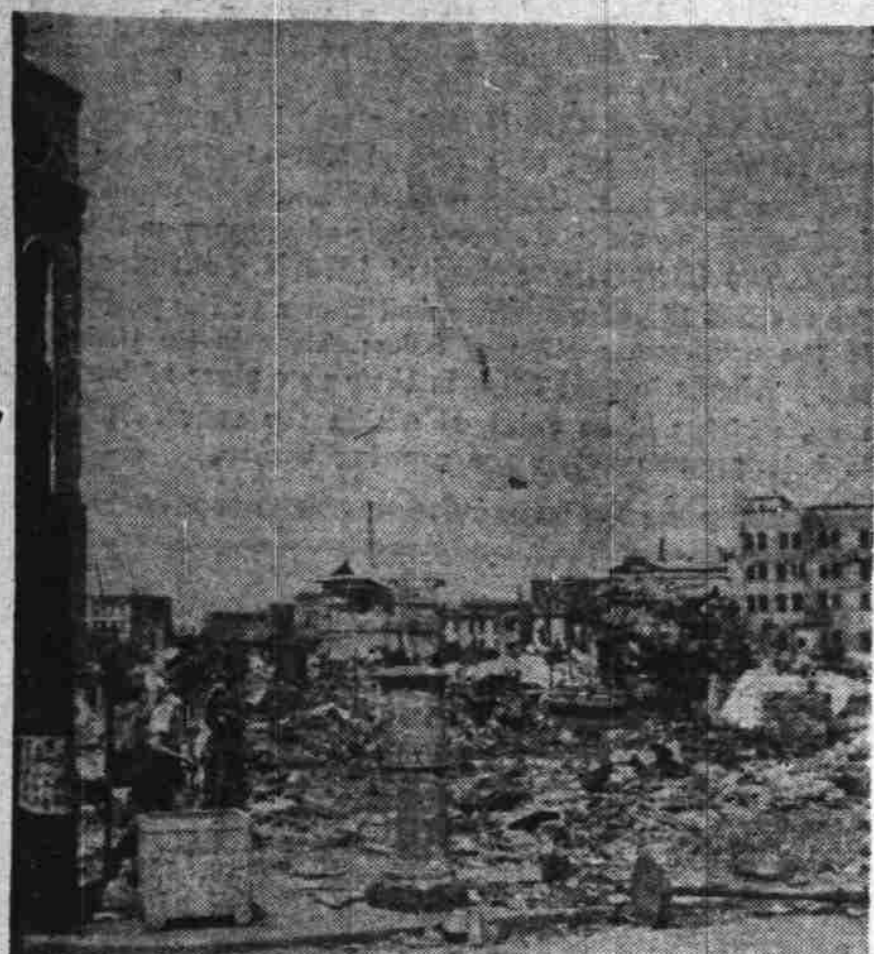


Only the Framework Remains

Elementary Schools to Open Sept. 10, 11 to Talk With Parents

Elementary school principals will be in their buildings from 1:30 to 3:30 p. m. Monday and Tuesday, September 10 and 11, to confer with parents of children new to the schools in Salem and those entering the first grade, Superintendent of Schools Frank B. Bennett said Thursday.

Elementary school pupils who attended schools in Salem last year will report to their schools for registration on Monday, September 17, for a short time. As soon as their registration is completed, Bennett said, they will be dismissed to secure supplies and materials and will start to school on Tuesday morning.

Jr. High Open Sept. 10 - 15

School offices at Parrish and Leslie junior high schools will be open to regular students from Monday through Friday, September 10 to 15, so that pupils may complete their registration. Superintendent Frank B. Bennett announced Thursday. All students living north of Trade street will attend Parrish, those living south will attend Leslie.

Two students will be required to share each locker, due to the number of lockers available this year at the schools and those who wish to share with a particular person, should report at the school together and make this arrangement, Bennett pointed out. Otherwise lockers will be given by impersonal assignment.

Students who have not previously taken care of their registration at the senior high school have been urged to do so at the earliest possible date.

Certificate Required
Those entering school here for the first time will be required to present a birth certificate or other evidence of age, he added.

School buses for these schools will run on normal schedule on Monday, September 17, and will deliver elementary pupils from the Capitola district to the school which they attended at the close of the 1944-45 school year for tentative registration. As soon as the definite enrollments are known adjustments will be made and definite assignments for the year given.

Bus to Be Used
In the Capitola district, pupils will be brought into the city to attend school at Garfield. A bus will pick up first and second grade pupils on Evergreen avenue and Lansing avenue, and will stop to pick up first and second grade pupils at the corner of Park avenue and Center. First and second grade children living east of Lansing avenue and north of Sunnyview avenue may either attend school at Englewood school or catch the bus at the corner of Lansing and Sunnyview avenues. Children south of Sunnyview will continue at Englewood school except for children east of Park and south of D street, who will catch their bus at the corner of Park and Center.

Bus number 17 will deliver pupils to the Highland school and bus number 19 will deliver them to the Washington school.

With the exception of the pupils in the Capitola district, school children should register in the school which serves the territory in which they now reside, Bennett said.

Tanzer Victim Of Suffocation

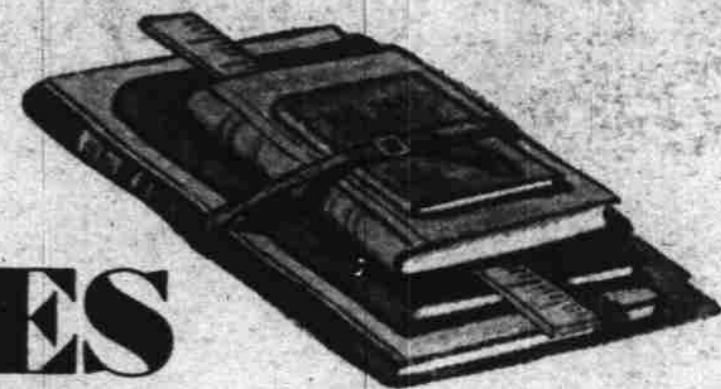
John H. Tanzer, 42, 425 North 17th, died Thursday in a house fire at East State and Elm avenue, apparently the victim of suffocation.

First aid men said they were called to the scene by residents in that area and reported that a davenport and a chair burned and that Tanzer apparently had inhaled fire. The body was turned over to the county coroner for further investigation.

The house, which is believed to belong to the Fetch estate, was saved by the Four Corners fire department.



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
