NEW YORK, Sept. 12-(A7)-Stock market prices advanced fractions to around 3 points and closed near the best levels of today's session with new 1945 highs sprinkled liberally throughout the

The rail group and a handful of utilities proved exceptions in the upturn but even their extreme losses were reduced or evased in a number of cases.

Steels, motors, rubbers, retail stores, farm implements, aircraft, metals and chemicals added sizable gains.

Buying orders predominated because of an improved tax outlook due to a house committee's promise to enact measures to reduce 1946 payments. Investment of idle funds and switching from war to peace-rated stocks also stimulated demand.

The Associated Press 60-stock composite reached 69.4-new high since April 23, 1937, and compared with 69.0 yesterday. Industrials hit 93.4, new peak since Table of Aug. 26, 1937, and utilities touched 47.9—a summit since March 2, 1937.


