## Merrick Tells Of 'Y' Program At Lions Club

The YMCA, comprised of literally thousands of organizations, all operating as entities but under the same rules and for the same purpose, is to be found in 68 different countries today, Vernon Merrick, program director for the Salem "Y," told the Hollywood Lions club Wednesday noon.

To combat vice and immorality among youth, the first Young Men's Christian association was founded more than 100 years ago, Merrick said. He paid tribute to the many persons who through voluntary contributions of time, effort and money have kept going the many projects which make the YMCA an organization interesting to boys and men.

Through the Gra-Y, Junior Hi-Y and the Hi-Y, the program of the YMCA is carried on extensively outside the association's building. Complete physical programs and religious training are offered in these clubs, he said.

Merrick told of extensive plans under way for enlargement and improvement of the Salem YMCA building to serve those now turned away for lack of space and facilities.

Essentially for the young, the "Y" makes provision for persons of all ages, he declared.
