

Cole, Ingram Named to Dept. Of Agriculture

Appointment of Arthur W. Cole as supervisor for feeds, fertilizers and economic poisons and of William J. Ingram as commercial feeds chemist for the state department of agriculture is announced by O. K. Beals, chief of the division of foods and dairies.

Cole, who holds his master's degree from Oregon State college, has been a Smith-Hughes instructor in Klamath county for 10 years and prior to that was employed in a creamery at Klamath Falls. Ingram, native of Lebanon, also holds a master's degree from Oregon State college and did graduate work at the University of California and University of Wisconsin. Prior to joining the department, he was for three years chemist for a cement concern at Oswego and earlier he taught at Grays Harbor junior college, Aberdeen, Wash.

Promotion of H. E. Bosell, Salem, with the department since July, 1941, as division field representative, to deputy state sealer of weights and measures has also been announced. Bosell, who served first in the southwestern part of the state and then in the central Willamette valley, succeeds M. Clarke Webb, resigned.

Other recent personnel additions and transfers include assignment of R. N. Smith, returned from service with the Seabees, as division representative in the far eastern Oregon counties with station at Baker. Wayne Lewis, formerly at Baker, has been moved to The Dalles to serve the new district of Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, northern Wheeler, Morrow and Umatilla counties.
