## County Farm Labor Office Sets Record

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—(Special)—Despite the letdown in local harvest help available immediately following the Japanese surrender, Oregon county farm labor offices filled more requests for farm workers in August than in any previous month since the OSC extension service has been in charge of the farm labor service.

In fact, practically every previous placement record was broken in August, reports J. R. Beck, state farm labor supervisor. The 47,739 farm job placements were higher than for any previous month. A new record of 506 war veterans were placed in farm work, 211 of them on year-round farm jobs.

A total of 3311 different farmers asked for 51,826 seasonal workers in August, making 13,580 different Oregon farmers who have received help through the county farm labor offices so far this year.

More than half the total placements for August—24,388—were for boys and girls under 18 years of age. This was in increase of more than 5000 youth over the same month a year ago, while adult workers showed a slight decline in numbers.

Largely because of the lack of enough local harvest workers Beck said, 2560 German prisoners of war were called in to fill emergency farm labor needs for the first 15 days of September.

## Census Ruling Handed Down

A constitutional provision for a state census every 10 years, beginning with the year 1865, is ineffective without statutory provisions of machinery for taking such a census, Attorney General George Neuner had today notified Senator Lew Wallace of Multnomah county.

Neuner also advised Wallace that a law could not be declared unconstitutional because of the composition of the legislature, since election and qualifications of members are judged by their own legislative bodies.

Wallace had questioned the legality of action of a legislature in which Multnomah county did not have as many legislatures as the constitution provides. Neuner pointed out that the constitution also limits the total number of legislators and that Multnomah county could not have more without other districts having less.

## Treasurer to Deposit State Monies Oct. 1

On October 1, 1945, State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott will deposit with the fiscal agency in New York City \$1,767,560.40 with which to pay \$664,000 in principal and \$105,078.89 in interest on Oregon state highway bonds, \$700,000 in principal and \$255,056.25 in interest on Oregon veterans' state aid bonds, and \$42,796 in principal and \$677.16 in interest on Oregon district interest bonds.

During October, 1945, the state treasurer will pay at his office \$29,000 in principal and \$12,027.50 in interest on bonds issued by the state board of higher education.

The principal payments will reduce the outstanding highway bonds to \$5,053,000, the veterans' bonds to \$11,275,000, the Oregon district interest bonds to \$1,189,590, and the state board of higher education bonds to \$1,237,000.

On October 1, 1945, the total state general obligation bonded debt will stand at \$17,517,590,

compared with \$85,062,816 on January 1, 1939. The net general bonded debt of the state on October 1, 1945, after deduction of assets and investments applying against the indebtedness will be approximately \$3,500,000.
