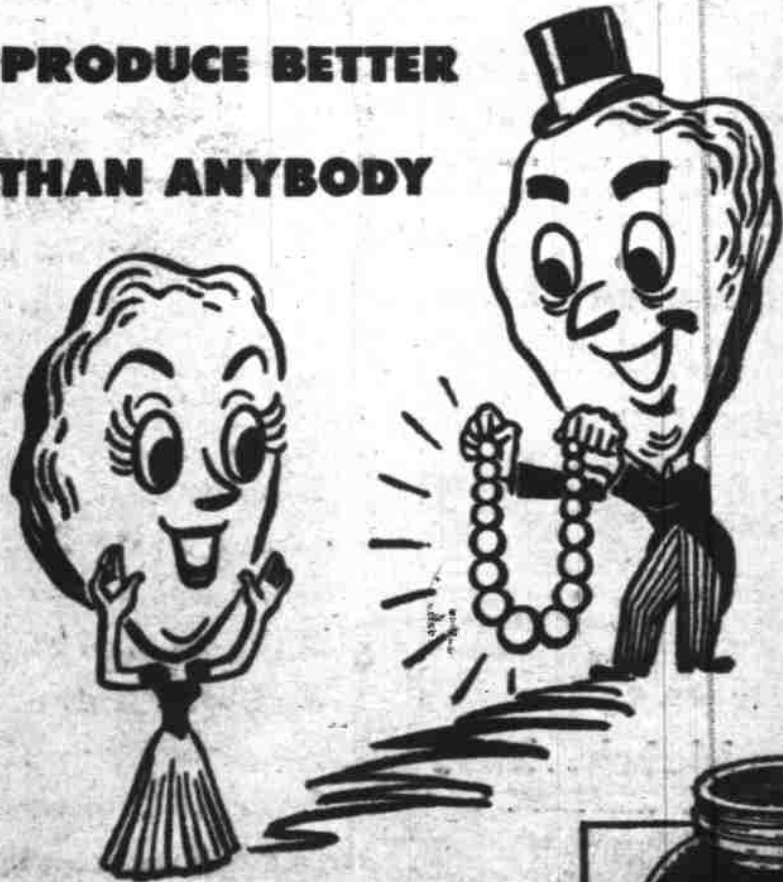
Mr. and Mrs. Kolb and their sons are temporarily located with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Doud, until they find living accommodations.

HALIBUT BAKED WITH CUCUMBERS
2 tablespoons butter
1 1/2 pounds halibut
Salt
3/4 cup water
1/2 cup evaporated
2 large cucumbers
Melt butter in baking pans in baking pan, set fish in pan and sprinkle with salt, add water and milk. Pare cucumbers, cut in halves crosswise and then in quarters lengthwise. Lay around fish and bake in a moderate oven until fish is done, about half an hour.

The peak of our Company's telephone shortage was in August. Then we had about 305,000 unfilled orders for service of which more than 298,000 were for service in residences.
