## Lt. Lewis R. Brown is Notified He Destroyed Two Nazi Planes

SANTA MONICA, Calif., Sept. 20.—First Lt. Lewis R. Brown, of 2631 Laurel ave., Salem, Ore., who is now at AAF Redistribution Station No. 3 here, has recently been notified that he is officially credited with two German planes destroyed, three probably destroyed, and three others damaged.

A P-47 fighter pilot, Lieutenant Brown ran up this score on a single mission on December 22, when he participated in a fighter sweep across Germany. After his encounter with the enemy planes, his P-47 was hit by flak and set afire, causing him to bail out directly into a German army camp.

**Tells Experiences**  
"Our 16 P-47's had just crossed the German border when we were notified that there were 'bandits' in the area. We sighted 50 German ships and attacked them from the top. One plane that I fired at promptly burst into flames. I shot the engine off another."

Lack of evidence, the fighter pilot said, prevented him from receiving credit for the other three "probables," since he never returned to the base that day to be interrogated.

"My ammunition was almost gone when I was hit by flak," he said. "The ship caught fire, and I was burned about the eyes and wrists. My coat sleeve and pant leg were almost burned away, and I kept passing out and reviving again. I bailed out at 12,000 feet, and passed out just after I left the ship. I woke up at about 800 feet and popped my chute."

**Was Prisoner**  
Landing in a German prison camp, he was taken prisoner, hospitalized, and interned in a prison camp until April 29, when he was liberated by the 14th Armored Division.

Prior to entering the service in September of 1942, Lt. Brown was employed by the Columbia Aircraft Corporation in Portland, Ore. He is a graduate of Salem high school. Now wearing the air medal with five oak leaf clusters, he has a purple heart due to be presented him soon.

**Autumn Air**  
Fall Fruit Takes Place On Menus

Dark mornings, bright noontimes and crisp night air are harbingers of fall — and that means autumn cooking.

Reminiscent of annual autumn canning days of our youth is apple butter with its spicy fragrance. Many a modern housewife feels that her canning activities are not complete until she's put a few jars down for winter eating.

Here's a basic recipe for fruit butter and you can use pears, peaches, apples or prunes.

**FRUIT BUTTER**  
Cook fruit with only a little water, when soft, run through a coarse sieve or colander. Skins are cooked with the fruit to add flavor. To each quart of pulp add 1 cup sugar either brown or white, 1 teaspoon cinnamon and 1/4 teaspoon cloves. Cook very slowly in a shallow pan until butter is thick. Be careful not to let the fruit scorch.

Another subject of distinctly autumn cookery is green tomatoes, much neglected in my estimation. As a meat accompaniment, sliced green tomatoes dipped in flour and broiled in butter can't be beat. Sometimes the cook likes to put just a little sugar in the flour.

Baked Danish or other small winter squash is another sure-fire favorite for early fall days. Some cooks who like to give different flavor to their dishes, sprinkle a squash with a little nutmeg just after it comes from the oven.

Fall fruits take a prominent place in the menus these September days.

Apple quarters, dropped into a syrup, slightly colored with red, and allowed to poach until done, will make salad if chilled, meat accompaniment if served hot, or dessert if topped with whipped cream or a soft custard sauce. Regular baked apples are good when filled with raisins and grated orange rind and cooked. They can be topped with crushed peanut brittle (when you find some), mixed with whipped cream.

Pears, too, can be served as salad, with the main dish or as a dessert. Baked pears, cooked with the skins on and basted during the cooking with dark corn syrup or caramelized sugar, are rich in flavor. You can top them with caramel syrup, custard or even chocolate syrup.

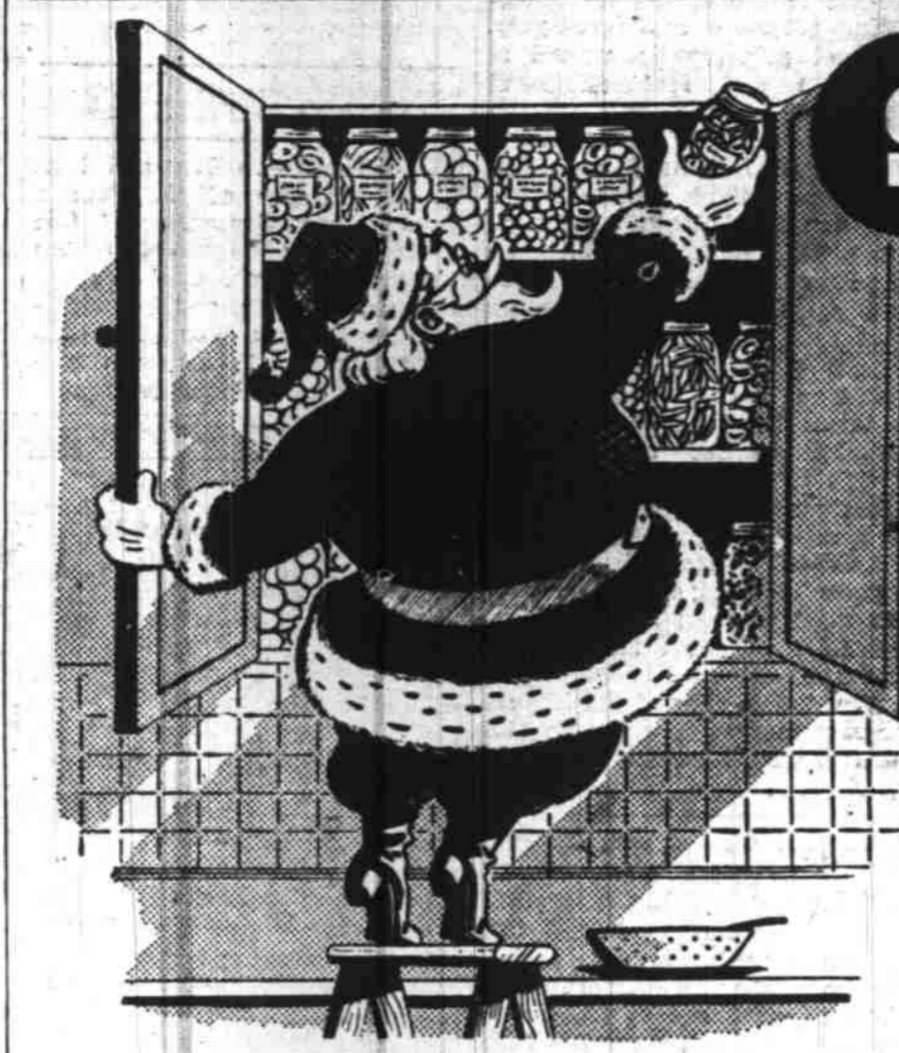
