

Salem Man on Honor Guard In Surrender

WITH THE 31st INFANTRY DIVISION IN MINDANAO—(Special)—PFC Roderick H. Hendrickson, a linesman with the 31st signal company, and PFC Elmer Lindh, a rifleman, both from Oregon, were two of 120 six-footers in the commanding general's guard of honor on Sept. 8 when Japanese Lt. Gen. Gyosaku Morozumi formally surrendered his Mindanao forces to the 31st division at Malaybalay.

Hendrickson and Lindh, and other members of the guard stood at attention in battle dress on either side of the crushed road walk to Brig. Gen. Joseph Hutchison's headquarters as Morozumi crossed the courtyard. The honor guard, composed of men from all units of the Dixie division, towered over Morozumi, senior Japanese officer on Mindanao.

After running this gantlet of giants, the goateed General Morozumi entered General Hutchison's bamboo headquarters to sign the papers which terminated most of Hendrickson's and Lindh's business on this island.

Hendrickson lives in Salem, Lindh at Grants Pass.

The RICHARD's crew hardly could believe the first peace flash and, to add to the skepticism, the general quarters alarm hit hours after the announcement, sending them to their battle stations.

"Gosh!" yelled one of the men as he seized his helmet and dashed for his gun mount, "the war's over—it would kill me to get killed now."

Eric Fitzsimons Takes Short Course at Nancy, Old French University

WITH THE UNITED STATES FORCES IN FRANCE — Private First Class Eric L. Fitzsimons of 1391 Market street, Salem, Ore., whose wife, Hulda, lives in Portland, Ore., is enrolled in an eight-week course in French language and civilization at the University of Nancy, France.

The University of Nancy, first founded in 1572 at Pout-a-Mouson, offered its facilities to the army's information and education program, and the current summer course is the first given at the university since 1939.

Classes in French language and civilization are taught by English speaking French instructors for three hours in the morning. Visits to museums, art galleries, and other places of interest in Nancy and the neighboring area occupy the afternoons.

Fitzsimons has been overseas since last May. He joined the army in September, 1940. He attended Willamette university, where he was a student at the time he entered the service.

Three Mid-Valley Men With 159th Now at Karlsruhe

WITH THE 106TH INFANTRY DIVISION OF THE SEVENTH ARMY — 535 members of the 159th infantry regiment of Maj. Gen. Donald A. Stroh's 106th Lion division have won bronze service stars for participation in major campaigns in both the Pacific and the European theatres of war.

In the group are PFC George C. Venable, 1027 W. 12th st., Albany; First Lt. Harold Nearing, Corvallis; S. Sgt. G. A. Johnson, Gervais and PFC Harold F. Peterson, route 3, Salem.

In the northern France campaign the 159th was among the units which held a ring of steel around the German forces in the French ports of Lorient and St. Nazaire. The regiment spent the Rhineland about a month before V-E day, and helped to corral

and hold tremendous numbers of prisoners of war in the Sinsig-Andernach area near the famous Remagen bridge.

The regiment is now stationed near Karlsruhe, in the American occupied zone of the southern Rhineland.

ON THE USS DUNLAP OFF CHICHI JIMA Sept. 3—(Delayed)—Darrel Leonard Woolridge, motor machinist's mate, second class, USNR, Route 7, Salem, Ore., today witnessed the surrender of all Japanese forces in the Bonin and the Marcus islands on the deck of this destroyer. Commander John H. Magruder, USN, commander of the marines, ac-

cepted the capitulation of Lt. Gen. Y. Tachibana, Jap commander. In full view of the crew, the Dunlap sank the first Japanese surface warship in World War II and opened the first American bombardment at Chichi Jima.
