WASHINGTON—More than 30 Townsend workers will arrive here this month to conduct an intensive campaign to enact the Townsend national insurance program. The staff will call personally on all 435 Congressmen requesting them to sign a discharge petition in behalf of HR 2229 and HR 2230, now in the house ways and means committees. When 218 Congressmen have signed, the bill must come to the floor.

Consumption of Gasoline High

Gasoline consumption in Oregon during the month of August this year was the second highest on record for that month in this state, Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, jr., disclosed today. Oregon motorists used 27,484,798 gallons of gasoline this August. The only August to exceed this consumption was August of 1941, when use totaled 30,737,874 gallons. August consumption this year was 26 per cent over the August use a year ago. For the first eight months of the year, gasoline consumption amounted to 186,640,982 gallons, an increase of ten per cent over the consumption of the first eight months of 1944.

Auctioneers Report Sale of Dairy Cows High

PORTLAND, Oct. 2—(AP)—Willamette valley auctioneers report dairy cows in greater demand than refrigerators and washing machines at farm auctions, the Oregon Journal said today. Buyers are paying \$35 to \$40 for "family cows"—discarded by farmers as culls. Large heifers for shipment to California bring \$140 to \$160. The newspaper said saddle horses sell better through classified ads than at sales; 30-40 pound weaner pigs now sell for \$8 instead of \$18.
