Grain Futures Nervous With Trend Upward

CHICAGO, Oct. 5-(AP)-Grain futures were nervous today and although the trend was upward fractionally most of the time, prices slipped occasionally and closed off slightly.

Hedge selling and profit-taking were principal factors preventing wheat from marching upward as it did yesterday, when it climbed as much as 4 cents a bushel. Mills and elevator interests were buy-

Stimulating oats buying part of the time was another 1 cent raise in the Canadian export tax, boosting the total tax to 23 cents a bushel.

Wheat closed 1/8 higher to 1/2 lower than the previous finish, December \$1.75 % - 1/4; corn was 1/8 off to 1/4 up, December \$1.16%; oats were 1/2 higher to 1/2 lower, December 65%-1/2; rye was unchanged to % down, December \$1.531/4-1/4, and barley was unchanged to 1/4 lower, December \$1.1614.

In the cash market, No. 2 red winter wheat was quoted at the \$1.79 ceiling, but no sales were reported. Cash corn also held at the ceiling price.

The Modern Miller, trade publication, said the quality of spring wheat in the fields in the Dakotas was deteriorating because of wet weather.
