

Lt. Jess Nunn's Silver Star for Risking Life

WITH THE 9TH INFANTRY DIVISION IN GERMANY - For risking his life to contact an isolated platoon during a severe enemy counterattack, First Lt. Jess A. Nunn of the 1st Bn, 47th infantry regiment, whose home is in Salem, Ore., has recently been awarded the Silver Star medal.

On July 11, 1944, in the vicinity of St. Jean De Daye, France, Lieutenant Nunn's company was facing a powerful German counterattack. During the attack, the -vital lines of communication between Lieutenant Nunn's company and adjacent defending elements were severed.

Of Nunn's actions, the official Silver Star citation reads in part: "Quickly realizing the seriousness of the situation, he unhesitatingly ex-posed himself to the intense enemy the situation, he unhesitatingly exposed himself to the intense enemy fire to contact the reserve platoon which was in a assistance to the stubbornly resisting elements. Although subjected to the concentrated fire and endangered by the infiltrating hostile forces, Lieutenant Nunn fearlessly moved forward, delivered the plans of operation and thereby enabled the units to launch a furious coordinated attack which routed the enemy. at the enemy.

The citation concluded, "Lieutenant Nunn's devotion to duty and courageous actions were instrumental in repulsing the enemy thrust and securing commanding terrain."

Nunn has been with the 9th infantry division since July 1942. At this time the division was at Fort Bragg, N.C. After entering the service in April 1941, he trained at Fort Lewis, Wash., until assigned to his unit. He wears the Bronze Star medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, the Purple Heart, Combat Infantry Badge, Distinguished Unit Badge, and the European-African-Middle-Eastern Theater Ribbon with eight battle stars.

Nunn graduated from Salem high school in the class of 1937. His wife, Nadine Nunn, resides at 1040 N. Church st., Salem. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Coburn live at route 4, Salem.
