

Memorial to be Held Sunday

Communion Table Will Be Dedicated for David Ringland

A new communion table in memory of PFC. David A. Ringland, U. S. Marine Corps, will be dedicated at 11 a. m. service Sunday morning at the Englewood United Brethren church. David was the son of Sgt. and Mrs. David L. Ringland of Salem, and was killed Nov. 14, 1943, on Bougainville. Sergeant Ringland was a marine recruiter during World War II and was pastor of Englewood United Brethren church 1939 to 1941.

The communion table memorial was chosen as most in keeping with the "living memorials" that are useful and practical. It will set under the stained glass windows in the chancel and has necessitated changing the seating arrangement of the choir. The new choir pews face the center of the chancel making an open-faced early church style chancel. The choir enters the loft from the two rear chancel doors. The public is invited to the dedication.

The pastor, the Rev. J. M. Goodheart, will preach on the subject and text, "Greater love hath no man than this." Monday morning, he will leave by plane for Illinois where he will join his wife and daughter who have been visiting relatives in the mid-west. The Rev. Goodheart will christen his niece in the Lutheran church of Roselle, Ill., preach in his home church at Bloomington, Ill., and then the Goodheart family will leave by train for California where he will visit his mother in Los Angeles. While there he will preach in Pomona, Bishop Warner's home church, and First Church in Los Angeles. Dr. Snyder, pastor of First Church Los Angeles, is to be the evangelist at Englewood U. B. in next year's pre-Easter services.
