

Army's Latest Jet-Propelled Plane Unveiled

BUFFALO, N.Y., Oct. 16 (AP)—The army air forces has unveiled its newest high-speed, long-range jet propelled fighter plane, the experimental XP-83, Bell Aircraft corporation, builder of the plane, announced tonight.

The new plane, being shown at the AAF's "open house" exhibition at Wright field, Dayton, Ohio, is the only fighter yet announced which is powered by I-40 jet engines, a Bell statement said. Absence of propellers enables the plane to carry a sizeable combination of machine guns and cannon. It also can carry bombs under each wing.

The plane's cockpit is located considerably forward of the wings and is equipped with bubble canopy, thus affording the pilot a high degree of visibility, Bell said.

Old Combatant Ships for Sale

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (AP)—President Truman cleared the way today for public sales of unneeded combatant vessels.

He signed an executive order providing for their sale to the highest acceptable bidder.

The order refers to combatant vessels stricken from the navy register and said they may be sold to the highest bidder, regardless of their appraised value, after having been offered for sale for a period of not less than 30 days.

The order identified the term combatant vessels as meaning battleships, cruisers, aircraft carriers, destroyers and submarines.

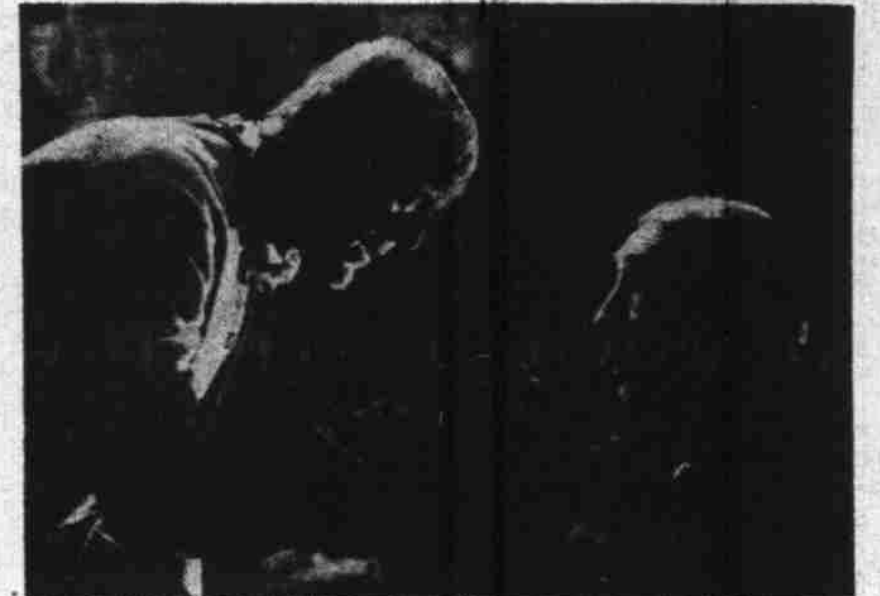

Grain Prices Decline; Rye Biggest Loser
CHICAGO, Oct. 16 (AP)—Liquidation and stop loss selling produced price declines throughout the grain futures market list today. The recession, against which traders in nearby wheat contracts offered mild opposition, was attributed by analysts to an overbought position resulting from several weeks of steady price improvement.

Rye suffered the biggest setback, the distant September contract closing 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 lower than yesterday. Losses of one cent or more were common, however, with some deliveries of wheat, oats and barley also showing that much or more downturn. Corn was fractionally easier.

At the close wheat was 3/4 to 1 1/4 lower than yesterday's finish, December \$1.76 1/4; corn was 1/4 to 1/2 lower, December \$1.18; oats were 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 lower, December 65 3/4; rye was unchanged to 1 1/4 lower; December \$1.59-1.59 1/2; barley was 1/4 to 1 lower, December \$1.17 1/2.

Some Issues In Late Rally On N. Y. Marts
NEW YORK, Oct. 16 (AP)—Selected steels, liquors, utilities and specialties exhibited belated strength in today's stock market although many pivots elsewhere backed into losing territory. The day's volume was 1,630,000 shares, the same as Monday. Early light selling was attributed to the persistent belief of a substantial technical correction of the lengthy forward swing was overdone. The inflation theme, predicated on the serious labor situation bringing rising wages and prices, still provided the main bullish argument. Earnings, dividends and tax hopes also restrained liquidation.
