Market Report Shows Hairy Vetch Scarce

That the nation's crop of alfalfa and red clover seed, still being harvested, may be a little larger than last year is shown by Tuesday's report from the state college extension farm market review.
While production is still quite uncertain, U. S. alfalfa seed is expected to be one per cent larger than in 1944, but one per cent below average. Production in the northern group of states is expected to be considerably under last year and the average, while the production trend is upward in the central and southern states.
Prospects Change
Production of red clover at the end of August gave promise of approaching the record production in 1929. However, on October 5 it appeared that the crop might be little, if any, larger than the large crop of last year.
Imports of alfalfa seed increased sharply during the year ended June 30, 1945. They were slightly over 10 million pounds, compared with 2,800,000 a year earlier.
Offerings Scarce
Carrot buying of winter cover crop seeds is about over for the season in the southeastern part of this country. Hairy vetch offerings were scarce. This kind of cover crop seed was being nominally quoted during the week at \$13 and upwards delivered at Atlanta. Prices of other kinds were unchanged. Seed stocks of southeastern dealers are in fair demand by farmers, although sow-

Most Bonds Still Held by Purchasers

PORTLAND (Special)—Purchasers of E, F, and G bonds still hold 83.2 per cent of the totals sold, according to figures released by the war finance committee. E, F and G bonds were first issued on May 1, 1941. Since that date, through September 30, 1945, a total of \$51,895,000,000 have been sold. Redemptions through September 30, 1945 totaled \$8,718,000,000 or 16.8 per cent of the amount issued, leaving 83.2 per cent still in the hands of the original investors.
U. S. savings bonds generally known as "Baby Bonds" series A, B, C, and D were first issued March 1, 1935. They were withdrawn from sale on April 30, 1941 after a total of \$4,518,000,000 had been sold. Redemptions through September 30, 1945 including matured series A bonds totaled \$954,000,000 or 21.12 per cent of amount issued.

Wage Rates Set By Regional WLB

SEATTLE, Oct. 16 (Special)—In the case of Pacific Fruit and Produce company, Oregon and southern Washington branches, and Joint Council of Drivers, local 37, AFL, the regional war labor board granted a rate of 95 cents an hour for truck drivers within a 25 mile radius in Astoria, Corvallis, Salem, Albany, Eugene and Roseburg, Ore. Truck drivers operating over more than a 25 mile radius were granted a \$1 rate.
Shipping and receiving clerk rates were set at 95c an hour. Rates for order clerks, checkers, packers and warehousemen were set at 85 1/2c. Rates for drivers of truck and trailer, tractor and semi-trailer, and 6-wheel trucks over eight tons were set at \$1.0625 per hour.
