Geographically, Europe at World's Economic Crossroads, Says Dr. Maser

"Although Europe and Germany be smashed to smithereens, not one but both will come back," Dr. Clifford E. Maser, professor of business administra-

tion at Oregon State college, told Salem branch, American Association of University Women, at its first meeting of the season Monday. Persons interested in peace would do well to try to raise Germany's morals rather than attempt to hold her down economically, is his theory.

Geographically, Europe has advantages over every other continent, he maintained. From the prevailing westerly winds which wash regular rains as far inland as Moscow to the fact that the cheapest of water transportation is at her door, natural advantages make Europe a center for population and for trade, Dr. Maser, who lived and studied there for several years in the 1930's, declared.
