## Salem High Classmates In Pacific

Sgt. Clyde Shreve, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Shreve, route 3, box 631, Salem, radio operator on a B-29, now stationed on Tinian, found recently that hospitalization can provide some fun for a soldier overseas.

Shreve, who helped complete the bombing of Japan, looked up from his hospital bed, where he was receiving a few days' care for a tropical disease, to see who was bringing the music into his ward -- and there was Patricia Meisinger of Salem, accordionist, who has been to Europe and the Pacific with USO camp shows.

Shreve and Miss Meisinger were Salem high school classmates.

The sergeant has two brothers in the service and a third, Earl Shreve, has recently been discharged as a sergeant after European service with the AAF.

Lt. Roy Shreve is in the finance offices at Ft. Dupont, Del., and PFC Wayne Shreve, AAF, is stationed at Tampa, Fla.

## Stayton Man on Navy's Famous Swimming Team

Leonard F. Sergeys, BM 1/a, of route 1, Stayton, Ore., served with an underwater demolition team -- the navy's famed group of expert swimmers who paved the way for invasions of enemy-held beaches. They served at Normandy, southern France, Saipan, Tinian, Peleliu, Angaur, Iwo Jima, Lingayen, Zamboanga, Okinawa, Tsugen Shima, Kerama Reto and in the occupation of Japan.

The work of Underwater Demolition Teams was vital to the success of landing operations. Their story was told in a recent issue of the Saturday Evening Post in an article by Comdr. Harold B. Say, who has just returned to Salem.

They cleared enemy beaches of obstructions and blasted ways through reefs so landing ships might enter. Their casualties -- as high as 40 per cent at Normandy -- helped keep down the losses among the men who attacked on D-days, always days after the "saunders in trucks" had done their work.

## John W. Danforth Commended for Philippine Action

FIFTH AIR FORCE, Tokyo -- Maj. John W. Danforth, husband of Eleanor Wright Danforth, 785 Stewart street, Salem, is now serving under the Fifth air force service command as commanding officer of an airdrome squadron in the occupational Fifth air force.

Major Danforth assumed command of his squadron at Tucson, Ariz., in October, 1943, and took it overseas in January, 1944. For the past 20 months he has led his outfit through the New Guinea and Philippine campaign.

Recently Major Danforth received from Gen. George C. Kenney, commander of allied air forces in the southwest Pacific, a commendation reading as follows:

"Your commendable action in dispersing aircraft at an airdrome in the Philippines island, to prevent their destruction by enemy bombing, strafing and naval fire, has been brought to my attention. I wish to express my appreciation of your outstanding performance. It is through the devotion to duty of men such as yourself that the Far East air forces have been able to achieve their repeated successes. You have rendered a material contribution to the effective prosecution of the war and to our ultimate victory."

WITH THE 24th INFANTRY (VICTORY) DIVISION OF MINDANAO -- First Lt. James E. Fiedler, a forward observer for a field artillery battalion, has been awarded the bronze star medal for heroic achievement for exposing himself to fierce enemy machine gun fire in order to adjust artillery fire, during the bitter fighting around Davao City.

Lieutenant Fiedler adjusted fire until an enemy gun was silenced. Then he shifted fire to the Jap emplacements across the Davao river until they too were silenced.

This enabled the riflemen to storm across and secure the opposite bank.
