## Near \$16 Million of Tax Load Paid

Oregonians have paid \$15,913,000 of the more than \$24,000,000 they are expected to pay this year in taxes on their 1944 incomes, State Tax Commissioner Earl Fisher said Tuesday.

First of the blanks on which to file 1945 returns probably will go into the mails within 30 days, it was said in commission offices, where this fiscal year's income tax collections were early estimated at \$24,372,000, a figure tax commissioners now believe will be exceeded.

The law provides that returns for 1946, based on this year's incomes, shall be filed with the commission not later than April 1 of next year. Next year's income tax receipts will be slightly lower than this year's, Fisher predicted Tuesday.

## Portland Traffic Death Toll Shows Increase

PORTLAND, Oct. 30.—(AP)—This city's 1945 traffic death toll is 87 per cent higher than for the same period last year, the traffic safety commission reported today.

Director Ben F. Heinz, who listed 54 fatalities, warned that winter hazards will increase accidents the next two months.

Portland has had 1142 school-age youth involved in accidents this year.

## Asks Extension Of Fishing Law Jurisdiction

Extension of jurisdiction of Pacific coast states over offshore fisheries beyond the three-mile limit for better enforcement of laws was proposed here Tuesday in a meeting of a sub-committee of the interstate cooperation committee of the 1945 legislature.

Sen. Walter Pearson, Portland, presided. Arne Soumela, state fish commission, was selected by the group to meet with directors of the Washington and California fisheries, in an effort to obtain the cooperation of those states.

The meeting probably will be held in Salem late in November. Tightening of existing laws regulating off-shore fishing also will be attempted.

Committee members reported that studies of the Columbia river by Washington and Oregon officials is now progressing satisfactorily with the result that additional legislation will be sought at

the 1947 legislature. Other legislation will be asked in connection with the Oregon razor clam industry which, according to reports, is being depleted. In the state of Washington, Soumela said, clam digging is on a sustained yield basis.

Frank Wire represented the state game commission at the session.

Members of the sub-group, besides Pearson, are Senators P. J. Stadelman, The Dalles, and Frederick Lampert, Salem, and Representatives W. W. Chadwick, Salem, and Alex Barry, Portland.

## Earl Cooley's Successor To Be Selected Soon

Selection of a permanent successor to Earl R. Cooley, state supervisor of agricultural education in the state vocational education department, probably will be considered at the next meeting of the state board of education, officials said here Tuesday.

Ralph Morgan, assistant state agricultural supervisor is filling the position pending appointment of a successor to Cooley, who died unexpectedly at his home here last Friday.
