MT. ANGEL—Maurice A. Niessen, S 2/c, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Niessen of Mt. Angel, told of his experiences in the Okinawa typhoon in a letter to his parents. His ship was one of the 163 ships lost in the area and at the time of his writing he and his companions were on an island upon which they had been washed ashore. They were living in the one building left standing on the island.

He anticipates little or no mail from home for some time as he says all the post offices were "blown away."

Your alertness, efficiency and conscientious attention to duty as exemplified by your actions on this occasion is worthy of the highest praise. It is a pleasure to write this letter of commendation."
