Utility Plants' Assessment to Remain Level

No material change in the assessment of Oregon utility plants during the next year is anticipated, although gross tax revenues from these properties may show a reduction later, Coe McKenna, state tax commissioner, declared here Friday.

McKenna's prediction for lower gross revenues was based on the manufacturing plants and curtailment of operations of some private industries. He added that creation of people's utility districts throughout the state also would have a tendency to cut into the income of private electric companies with a resultant lower tax revenue base.

McKenna said he would soon start an exhaustive study of the entire utility tax setup. In conducting this survey, McKenna indicated that he personally would inspect many utility plants, talk with their officials, and otherwise attempt to gain information valuable in fixing valuations and assessments.
