selling it. Next I dropped over to the ten cent store where once they advertised "nothing over 15 cents." Shopping early assures me that the wooden toys, red candles, Christmas tree ornaments and inexpensive gifts will not be all gone.

Progressing over to the gift department in one of the stores I found a wide assortment of gifts. Attractive is the line of California ceramics: a large white piggy bank with gold \$5 all over it, with a cigar in its mouth and a gold ribbon about its neck, priced at about \$25; the white cat with a fancy hat of gold, that sells for \$25 and the attractive figurines of various sizes from \$10 on up.

Further on in our shopping we found handkerchiefs of muslin, at \$1 and \$1.50, pretty but not linen, yet. There were place napkin sets of 9 pieces for \$5.98-made to simulate hand woven and printed cloth napkin sets at \$7-7.98.

One window shows suitcases, thermos bottles and flashlights, good gifts for young son or dad. There are wooden trains, wooden scarfs, colored dickeres to go with the new fall suit, some attractive men's bathrobes, a wide selection of pictures.

Along the street we see displays of fancy soap at \$1 a box of four or six, books, tools for the handyman, pottery sets of 32 pieces, cookie jars and furniture.

The selection is pretty good right now, and it's a toss-up whether to buy now, when you can get things, or wait for better merchandise-taking a chance on lowering or raising of prices.

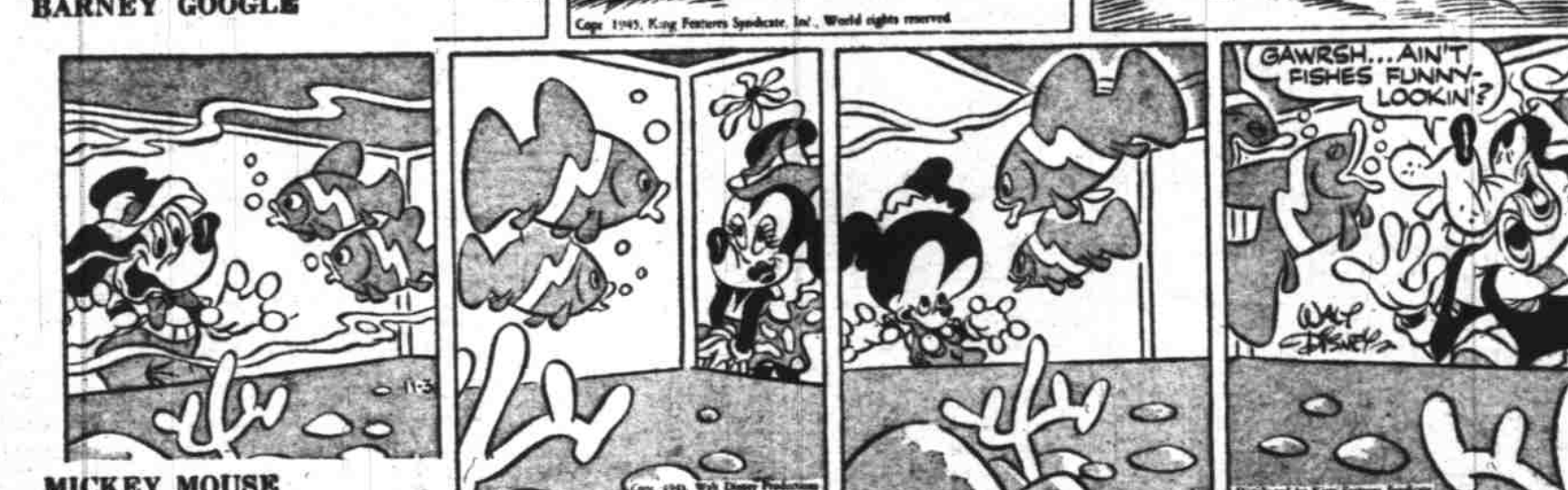
