Mr. and Mrs. Parke Hammer and family of Lebanon visited at the M. C. Huston home Sunday.

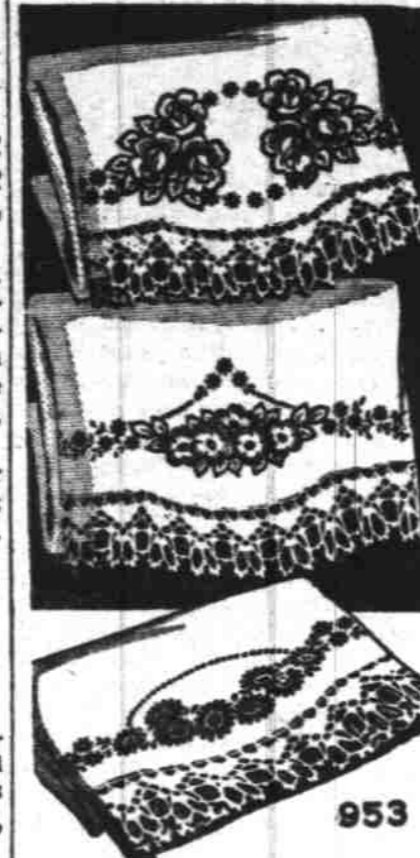
Albany Accident Injuries Listed

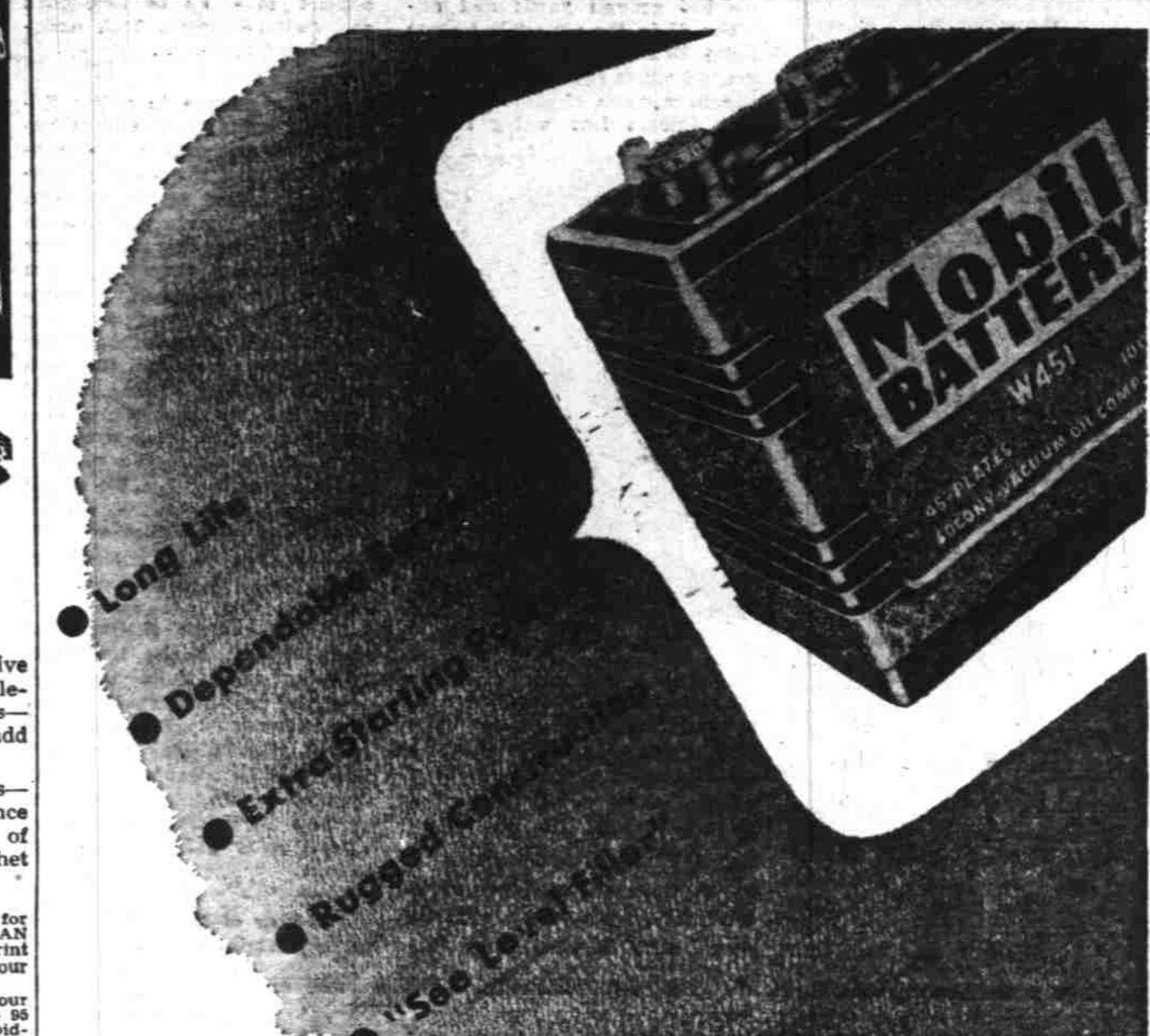
