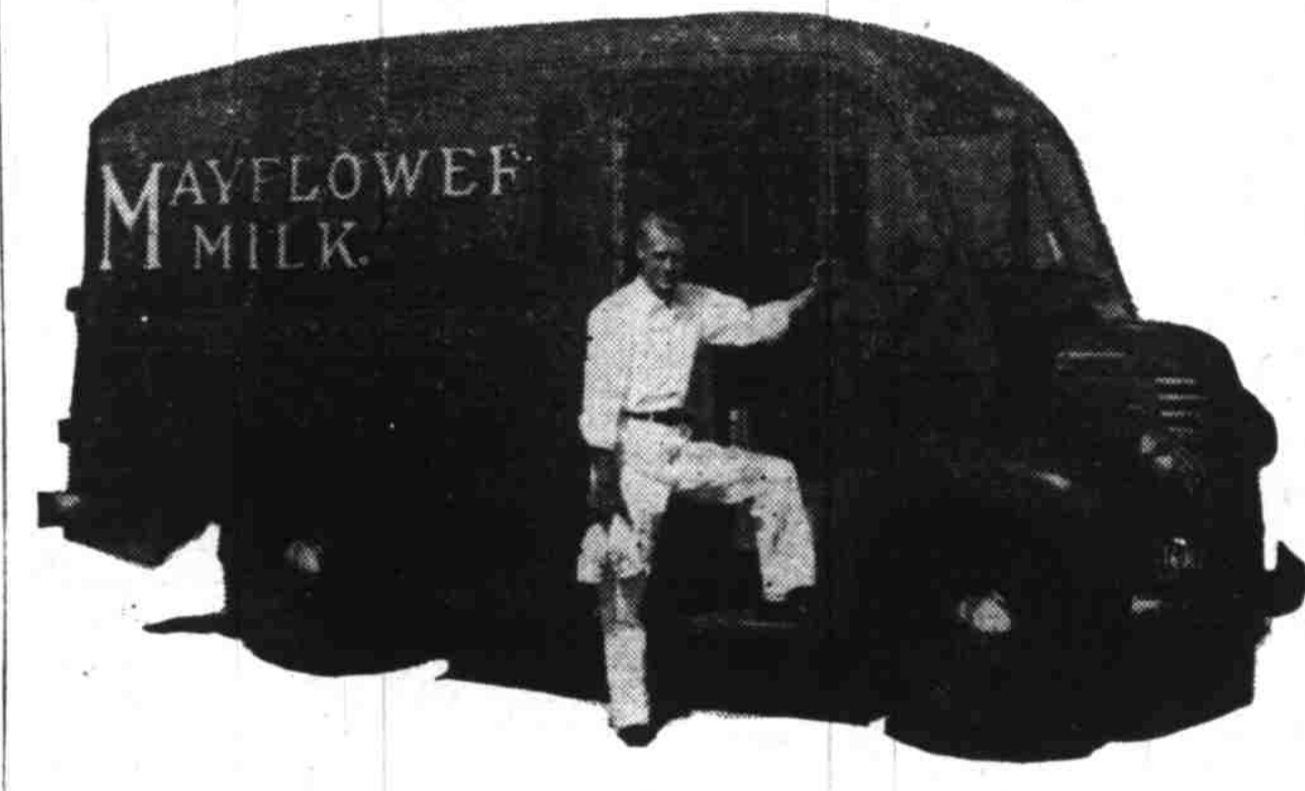

Child Burned While at Play

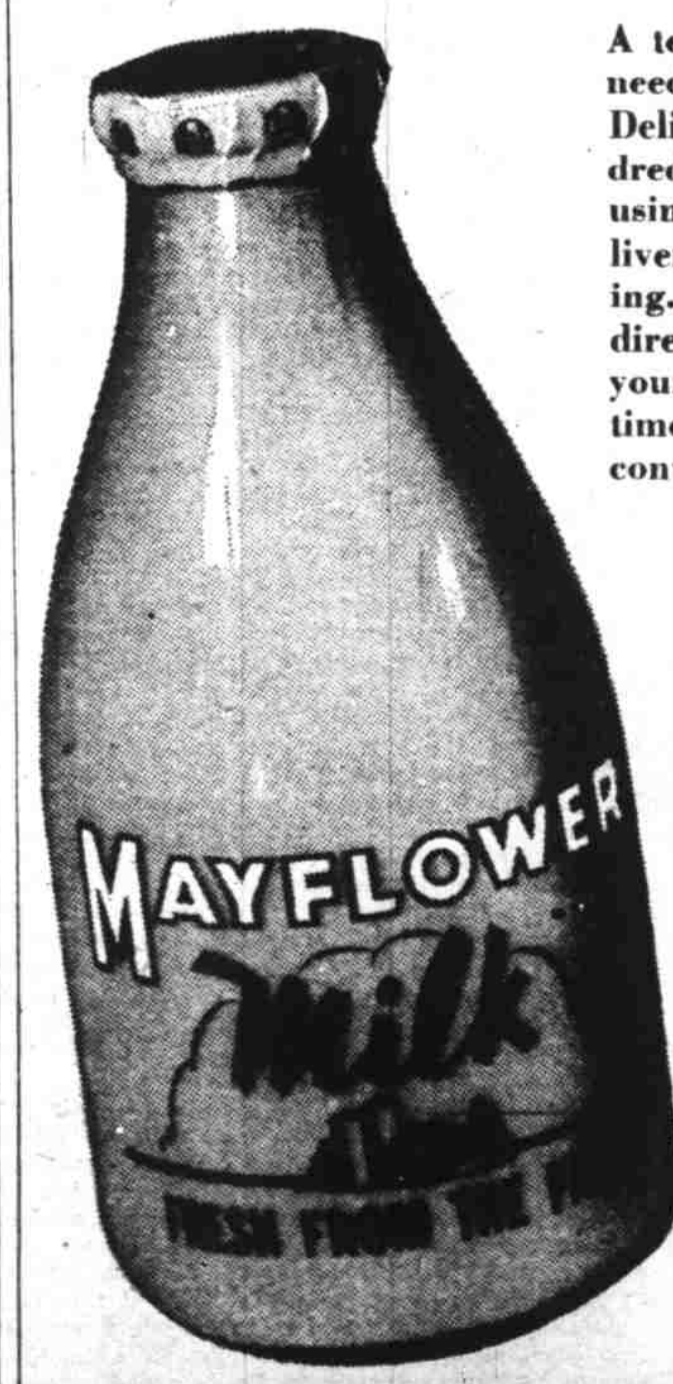
