

McCulley Among First to Come Back From Tokyo

WITH THE FIRST CAVALRY DIVISION IN TOKYO — PFC Elton W. McCulley, Salem, Ore., is among the first group of men selected from the first cavalry division to return to the United States from Tokyo.

Overseas 15 months, Private McCulley is now serving with the MP platoon. A veteran of four campaigns, he wears the Asiatic Pacific theatre ribbon with campaign stars for New Guinea, the Admiralty Islands, Leyte and Luzon, the combat infantryman's badge and the Philippine Liberation ribbon with two bronze stars.

As a civilian, Private McCulley was employed by the Oregon Pulp and Paper company, later entering the army and took basic training at Camp Maxey, Tex.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John D. McCulley, resides at 1155 Nebraska st., in Salem, Ore.

Captured at the fall of Corregidor, he worked every day including Sundays in the Japanese coal mines. He received two bowls of rice and a cup of tea for his daily diet. When first captured he was weighing 195 pounds. When he got to San Francisco he weighed 95 pounds. He spent more than two years in the prison, and was released on his 23rd birthday.

He is gaining weight now and

otherwise improving, but doesn't laugh or smile, yet, his mother reports. A native of Monmouth he attended schools here before the family moved to Lewiston. A sister, Mrs. Betty McDaniel, lives at Lewiston; and one brother, Charles, is in the San Diego naval hospital recovering from an accident suffered while in the naval air force. He lost one eye and his right knee was crushed.

EMMONS AT TOKYO

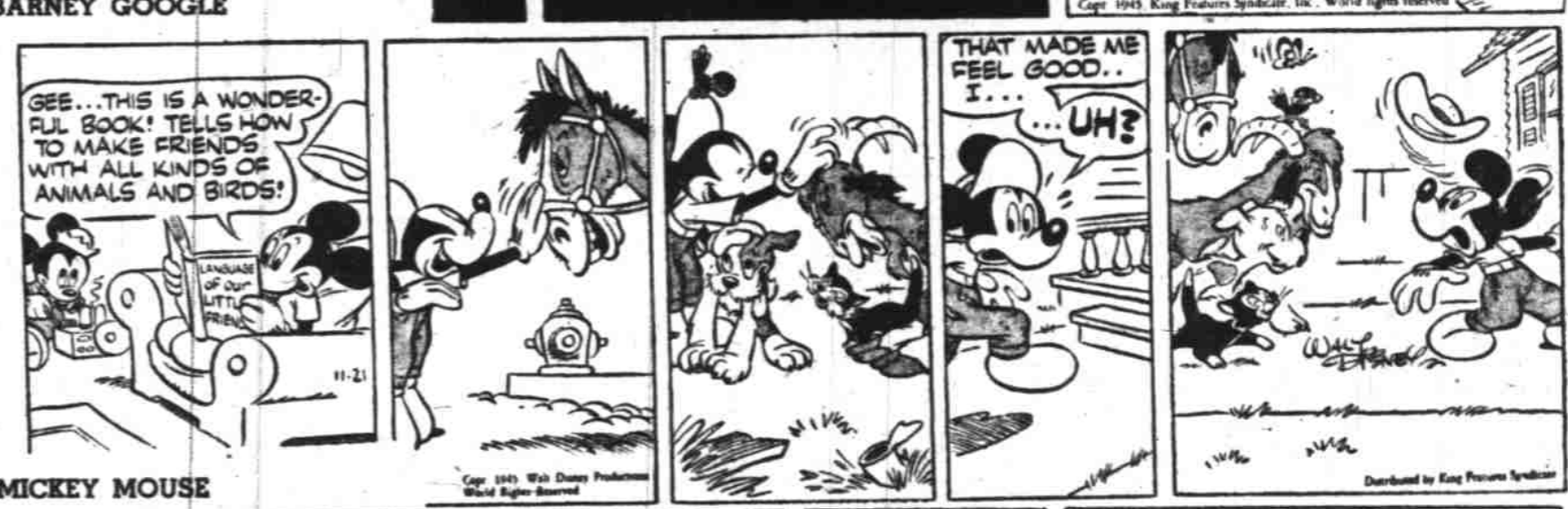
