## Industrial Safety Conference Slated

The second Oregon industrial safety conference, conducted by the accident prevention division of the state industrial accident commission, will be held in Salem December 13 and 14, Paul E. Gurske, commission chairman, announced Wednesday.

The program will be based on a practical approach to Oregon's peacetime industrial problems. Special panels on accident prevention will be held.

There will be a dinner program Thursday night.

## Law Prevents Schools From Building Plan

More than three-fourths of the Oregon school districts are barred from building modern one-room school buildings through a bonding campaign, even though they bonded to the limit, Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction, declared here Wednesday.

Putnam said the existing laws prohibit bonding for school construction purposes in excess of five per cent of the district's property valuations. To erect a \$12,000 one-room school the districts would have to have property valuations of \$240,000, Putnam averred.

In Polk, an average county, only 13 of the 73 school districts would have to have property valuations in excess of \$250,000.

Putnam indicated that an effort may be made at the next legislature to change the law to increase the present bond limitation, provided costs of materials and manpower remain at their present levels.

## Ask Continuation Of Price Controls

Dubbing themselves "employees with middle class incomes," 29 Portland workers initiated and signed a petition sent to McDannell Brown, Portland district OPA director, expressing themselves "in favor of continued price control on all commodities including rents, until conditions are naturally stabilized."

Brown said a few days before the letter arrived he had had a telephone call from one of the men expressing deep concern that price controls would be lifted prematurely so that the man of average income would not be able to meet living costs. Because this is "Victory over Inflation" week, Brown released excerpts as being of general interest.

## Heart Attack Kills Independence Man

## Stores Asked to Turn in Tokens

All red tokens in possession of retailers, wholesalers and primary distributors of rationed meats and fats must be turned in to ration bank accounts by December 11, G. M. Hafenbrack, OPA ration banking executive, advised today. The meats-fats ration stamps, however, need not be turned in, but may be disposed of.

The tokens, used in the ration program as change-makers, are government property, Hafenbrack pointed out, and are to be collected in order to prevent their misuse. The tokens need not be counted and may be placed either in the standard containers or in a sealed envelope.
